Information Session with Georgetown University, USA

North South University's Office of External Affairs organized an online information session with Georgetown University, USA on September 9, 2021. Ms. Sophie Al Mutawaly, Admission Analyst, Ms. Johanna Gutierrez, Assistant Director of Graduate Admissions and Ms. Julie Ito, Director of Admissions at Georgetown University, USA were present as speakers and represented the university during the webinar.

The interactive session was conducted through Zoom and was shared via Facebook Live on the official Facebook page of NSU OEA.

The event started with a brief introduction of the attendees and progressed through an exciting presentation about Georgetown University from Ms. Julie Ito. The informative presentation consisted of a general overview, history, location and academic structure of the university. She mentioned that the Graduate School of Georgetown University was founded in 1820 and has been one of the key targets for both local and international students for higher studies.

During her presentation, Ms. Ito discussed the academic segmentation and different Schools of Georgetown University as well as briefly explained the degrees offered. She especially mentioned the extraordinary campus resources that the university avails to its students. Georgetown University offers several postgraduate services such as its career center, Hoya gateway, international networks, etc. to help students with further studies and career planning. The Univer-

sity highly emphasizes on-campus safety for its students,

particularly the international students.

Afterwards, the speaker presented the audience with a glimpse of life in Washington DC. As one of the world's most opportunistic cities, Washington DC has many exciting internship, part-time and full-time job opportunities on offer for the students and graduates. In this context, she mentioned the procedures and methods of applying for and getting student and work visas in the USA.

The information session intended to avail necessary, authentic and first-hand information about the academic structure,

system and functional units of Georgetown University. Serving this purpose, the guests discussed the application requirements-transcripts and evaluation processes, test scores, recommendation letters, SoP, Resume/CV, etc. for the interested applicants in detail. They also explained the application procedure and application timeline of Georgetown University in brief. Furthermore, the speakers mentioned the tuition fees, financing options and financial aid opportunities offered by the university, especially for the international students. The consideration of deadline while applying for admission was especially emphasized during the session.

NGO Talk Show Episode 1



Office of External Affairs (OEA) of North South University has recently initiated a new event titled 'NGO Talk Show'. This is a web-based talk show program arranged as part of the outreach efforts of the OEA with the objective to extend the research and internship opportunities for NSU with different nation-

al-multinational government-registered NGOs working in Bangladesh. The talk shows are conducted over Zoom and streamed live over Facebook on the NSU-OEA's official page.

The very first episode of the 'NGO Talk Show' was launched on September 12, 2021 with 'Light House'. The name of the event was 'Developing Bangladesh: Scope for Research between NSU and Light House'. As the keynote speaker of the event, we had Mr. Md. Harun-Or-Rashid, Founder and Chief Executive of Light House. From the Office of External Affairs, Dr. Katherine Li, Director and Mr. Mehedi Masud Sumon, Officer attended the meeting.

The event started with a brief introduction of 'Light House' by Mr. Harun-Or-Rashid. 'Light House' started its journey in a limited way back in 1992; later it went full-swing from 1997. During the discussion, Mr. Harun-Or-Rashid informed us about the core objectives and activities of his NGO. He mentioned that 'Light House' is solely devoted to the development of Bangladesh and has been working on sensitive yet essential issues like education, drugs awareness, sexual health, etc. for ensuring the social welfare of our country. The organization emphasizes community-based actions and encourages engagement of youth in change and the development process. Currently, 'Light House' and the Bangladesh Government are working hand-in-hand as most of their recent projects are associated with the government.



The discussion session highlighted the promotion of joint research/publications, resource/grants mobilization for research, internship opportunities for students, exchange of research outcomes, academic publications, and other academic information, promotion of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) through research and practice, joint training workshops on topics of mutual interest and other opportunities for both parties through academic collaboration which will be a win-win situation for both parties.

Mr. Harun-Or-Rashid mentioned that for the execution of such joint programs, proper planning and static designing is a must. According to him, the real life case-based internship opportunities at 'Light House' can offer NSU students first-hand experience and practical knowledge. As for the collaborative research programs, he neither prioritized action nor commission-based research methods, rather suggested to emphasize the needs and preferences of students and faculties regarding research topic or method. He also suggested long-term beneficial research with sustainable development goals in mind for effective and timely outcomes. Finally, Mr. Harun-Or-Rashid proposed organizing specific topic-specific yearly campaigns in cooperation with NSU for better engagement of the students in development projects as well as for availing preferable research and internship opportunities to them. NSU Alumni Talk Show Episode 48

The forty-eighth episode of the NSU Alumni Talk Show aired on September 13, 2021. For this episode, we had Mr. KM Raihan, a distinguished alumnus of North South University from the School of Business and Economics, batch 2009. Mr. Raihan completed his undergraduate degree from NSU in 2012 and afterwards, received an MBA from Institute of Business Administration (IBA), Dhaka University. His professional journey so far has been entirely in the telecommunication sector of Bangladesh. He has the experience of working in three of the leading companies of the telecommunication industry – Airtel, Robi and Banglalink Currently, he is associated with Banglalink as the Senior Manager – Product and CVM.



The event started with a discussion about Mr. Raihan's journey and experience from his job roles as well as in the telecommunication industry. His current role at Banglalink is to escalate the revenue and increase profitability of the employer company. According to Mr. Raihan, the telecommunication industry is one of the industries that has been intensely affected by the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. The entire industry had to adapt to the changes of the lifestyle of the consumers and evolve business conduct accordingly. Almost all the telecom companies implemented 'work from home' policies when the pandemic hit and most of them, including Banglalink, are still in that mode.

As our guest has a quite long history of working in the corporate sector of Bangladesh, he shared some insights about the essential hard and soft skills needed to succeed based on his observations and understanding. In this context, he emphasized having profound knowledge about current affairs locally and globally. He especially mentioned proper communication skills, analytical skills, knowledge and application-oriented learning for succeeding in professional life.

Higher studies is another topic about which Mr. Raihan shared some insights with the audience. He said, "There is no hard and fast rule about the timeline of higher studies, this decision should be made in alignment with one's career goals, needs and preparation." Additionally, he mentioned that some amount of industry experience and knowledge about data science can be of a great help for enrolment, succession and efficiency of higher studies.

In the latter segment of the show, the discussion turned towards the campus life of Mr. Raihan at NSU. He had a very happening campus experience with a tons of memories with faculties, course mates and acquaintances. Mr. Raihan mentioned that a significant part of his undergraduate life was case solving competitions as he participated in a number of such competitions. According to him, NSU graced him with a dynamic platform and opportunity for networking at a massive scale. The academic structure and culture of NSU has nurtured him to be confident, realistic, presentable and practical. As a senior alumnus of the university, he suggested to develop soft skills, networking acumen and to carry a welcoming attitude for continuous learning and improvement. He also highly encouraged seeking mentorship and help from faculties, seniors and alumni without hesitation.

The forty-ninth episode of the NSU Alumni Talk Show aired on September 15, 2021. For this episode, we had Mr. Riasat Hussain, an eminent alumnus of North South University from the Department of Business Administration, Batch 2008. Mr. Hussain graduated from NSU in 2016 and afterwards, completed his Masters in Masters' of Commerce, Marketing and Business Management Subject from Macquarie University, Australia. In his professional life, he has worked with renowned organizations like AC9 Limited, V9ON Limited, etc. Currently, he is working as the Manager of International Marketing, Recruitment and Conversion at Macquarie University, Australia.



In the beginning of the show, Mr. Hussain shared his activities, responsibilities and experiences of his current role as an administrative staff of a well-established university. His responsibility requires his attention and effort in two separate but interconnected sectors – one is the International Contact Center that communicates with students and responds to them and the other is the Digital Communication and Events which organizes interesting live sessions via a digital studio.

As Mr. Hussain has been closely associated with the education sector for quite a while, he has a clear idea about the multiple effects of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic on global education. He mentioned that, like all the other regions of the world, the COVID-19 pandemic has caused a serious impact on the overall educational structure of Australia. Nevertheless, Macquarie University has not only survived the hit but has adapted to the new normal in minimal time as the university had been advocating digitalization from before the pandemic. According to Mr. Hussain, the virtualization of academic activities went smoothly for Macquarie University, but they faced challenges regarding the transformation of student support services, practical/lab courses and admission processes. For verification of the required documents for admission, their communication and reliance on partner universities has increased for the good. Additionally, he mentioned that the global MBA program Macquarie University had already experienced massive exposure, appreciation and popularity among the international students during the pandemic.

During the latter part of the event, Mr. Hussain shared some memories from his student life at North South University. He experienced a very enjoyable and diverse journey while studying at NSU. He was associated with student clubs of NSU during his student life which availed him a huge network and connection with fellow NSUers. He appreciated the nontraditional teaching method and course contents at NSU as well as the international outreach, excellent guidance and grooming that NSU offers the students.

As a senior alumnus of NSU, Mr. Hussain passed on some suggestions for the current students and recent graduates based on his experience. He emphasized having a clear vision, goals and building a network that can help to achieve the goals. About higher studies, he said, "Studying abroad is not only about the degree, but also about the experience." The episode show-cased Mr. Tanzil Ahmed, a distinguished alumnus of North South University from the Department of Business Administration, Batch 2007. Mr. Ahmed received his undergraduate degree from NSU with a dual major in Finance and Human Resources Management; afterwards, he started his professional journey with BRAC EPL Investment and was associated with the company for 3 years. Afterwards, he joined H&M and currently, he is working as the HR Business Partner and Talent Management Manager of the company.

In the beginning of the event, Mr. Ahmed discussed his current job – his responsibilities, goals and experiences for the role. He mentioned that for his current post, he supervises two

essential aspects of Human Resources Management – first one is Human Resources business partners and the other one is talent management. He especially appreciated the organizational culture of H&M because it offers the employees ample opportunities for growth. Mr. Ahmed also added that, as a multinational organization, H&M is highly diversity prone which he enjoys the most about their workplace culture.

From the very beginning of his career, Mr. Ahmed has been associated with the Human Resources Management sector and from his experience from the past 10 years in this field, he shared some insights about current HR practices in Bangladesh. He started off by saying that the HR practices of Bangladesh cannot be generalized as modern HR strategies and practices have not been adapted equally in most Bangladeshi companies. Some organizations have assimilated the new ways of Human Resources management very swiftly and effectively, whereas, other organizations are yet to cope with the trends. In this context, he emphasized attentiveness to the mental wellbeing of a company's employees from the HR Department and said that there was still room for improvement in this area.

Alongside his professional experiences, Mr. Ahmed shared memories from his student life at NSU with the audience during the show. He said that he was very sure about studying Business Administration from the beginning, thus he chose NSU as its Business Studies wing is very well-designed, enriched and effective. His campus life at NSU was diverse and memorable as he was associate with various extra-curricular activities besides academic activities. While talking about his experience at NSU, Mr. Ahmed especially mentioned the unique, effective and practical-based teaching methods of the highly qualified faculties of NSU.

From his years of experience in the corporate sector, he shared some suggestions for the current students and recent graduates of NSU for succeeding on their professional journey. 

As EducationUSA is focused on helping students with all support of all kinds to enroll in their desired American educational institutions, the representatives expressed interest in conducting on-campus information sessions and guidance programs about the preparation and application process for targeted universities or colleges for

have a great impact on the development of almost every sector, especially these organizations are playing a vital role on research prevalence and amplitude. They are also gaining some remarkable international appreciation, recognition, and attention.

The discussion session also stressed the promotion of joint research/publications, resource/grants mobilization for research, internship opportunities for students (both national and international), exchange of research outcomes, academic publications and exchange information, as well as joint training workshops. Mr. Khandaker also emphasized the promotion of the Sustainable Development Goals through research and practice. He expressed his interest in collaborating with NSU regarding the aforementioned sectors and expected more discussion and action on this matter.

As the guest and speaker of the event, we had Mr. Arfan Nazar, Member Committee President, A9ESEC, Bangladesh and Mr. Tanvirul Hasan, Local Committee President, A9ESEC, Bangladesh. Moreover, we had Ms. Sadia Sultana from the Career and Placement Center (CPC) of North South University present in the event. The interactive session was conducted through Zoom and streamed via Facebook Live on the official Facebook page of NSU OEA.

The event started with a brief introduction of the attendees. Afterwards, the floor was passed to the speakers to present their exciting speeches and presentations about the organization. The first speaker for the event was Mr. Tanvirul Hasan who started off by introducing the objectives and activities of AIESEC and presented a brief overview of the actions and achievements of the organization in Bangladesh. He mentioned that AIESEC is a global, independent, non-partisan, non-profit, student-run organization. It was established in 1948 after WWII with the objective to establish cross-cultural understanding, prevent conflicts and foster peace around the world. Currently, AIESEC is operating in more than 110 countries of the world with nearly 7,000 partners having more than 30,000 members and 1,000,000 alumni. The Bangladesh chapter of AIESEC was founded in 1997. Presently, the organization is running via two local committees in association with more than 12 universities and 8 organizations having a member pool of above 150 members.

As the event progressed, the floor was passed to Mr. Arfan Nazar who informed the audience about the events, activities and opportunities of AIESEC. AIESEC organizes different events and conducts activities to empower young people by developing leadership qualities and offering opportunities to seek enhancement. The organization tries to make a positive impact by initiating value-driven programs and events. The main objective of the arrangements and initiatives by AIESEC are intended to offer practical experience to its members in challenging environments. The organization seeks global talent and enables international internship opportunities for its associates. One such global talent program that Mr. Nazar mentioned was about Career 360 – an intensive 2-week cohort training for youth, organized with the target to develop soft and hard skills. He also provided the audience with the program details.

The event ended with a few words from Ms. Sultana, Job Counsellor, CPC and an ending remark from Dr. Li, Director, OEA. During her speech, Ms. Sultana mentioned the MoU between NSU and AIESEC and suggested considering arrangement of information

The agenda of the second meeting was to discuss the present work of Light House for the development of Bangladesh and the possible collaboration between NSU and Light House in terms of joint research, publication, research funding, student internships, and training opportunities after having interviewed Mr. Md. Harun-Or-Rashid for the NGO Talk Show on September 12, 2021. As the representatives from the Department of Public Health and School of Health & Life Sciences were present in the meeting, they had an opportunity to discuss common research interest areas between their respective departments and 'Light House'.



Dr. Li thanked the attendees for joining the meeting and appreciated the detailed discussion between the research associates of NSU and 'Light House' had the opportunity to have through the meeting. She also informed that NSU had an MoU with Light House which expired on 31 December 2018. She opined that the MoU between Light House and NSU needed to be updated and renewed for the researchers and most importantly the internship opportunities for the students of the Public Health Department.

After a detailed discussion among all the meeting participants, it was agreed to renew and update the MoU between Light House NGO and North South University. This will help the two research groups to have successful research collaborations, joint publications, and research projects, joint research proposal submissions for funding as well as training and internship opportunities for the students of NSU.


Collaboration Meeting with Massey University, New Zealand



An online meeting was held between Massey University, New Zealand and North South University, Bangladesh on September 27, 2021 as a part of the global outreach effort of the Office of External Affairs. The meeting was attended by the representatives of both universities. Dr. Katherine Li, Director, Office of External Affairs, Ms. Tasnia Azmeri Madiha,

Coordination Officer, OEA and Dr. Hasanuzzaman Sohail, Assistant Director, OEA represented North South University during the event. The representatives from Massey University included Prof. Jens Mueller, Director, Massey Executive Development, Ms. Patricia Bossons, Leadership Development and Coaching Lead, Massey Business School and Ms. Farhana Nalar, Associate Director, Global Engagement at Massey University.

The discussion about collaboration opportunities between Massey University, New Zealand and North South University has been going on since a delegation from NSU visited in March, 2020 just before the pandemic closed borders. The main objective of the meeting was to explore the opportunities of joint academic and research programs between the two universities. During the meeting, the attendees shared the distinct structural features of the schools and departments of both universities, evaluated the similarities and dissimilarities between the departments and systems. Based on these discussions, possible cross-teaching engagements, joint programs, etc. were suggested. Opportunities for a double master's program and research collaboration between departments of NSU and Massey University, New Zealand were highlighted. The Engineering department was specifically mentioned in this context. The establishment of a leadership program was also proposed. Finally, the attendees hoped for a successful execution of discussed joint programs and maximum student engagement via an academic partnership between the two universities.

Dr. Sultana completed her PhD at UQ Business School in 2017. Her PhD research focuses on the impact on stereotypical perceptions on the career progression of migrants in Australia. It aims to shed light on the factors inhibiting and facilitating advancement into management for Australian natives compared to migrants. The findings revealed that the experience of migrant's career progression into higher management positions vary based upon their categorization as immigrants and

race when perceptual judgment exists. Her research provided practical implications for organisations, human resource practitioners, migrants and employees, who can together minimise the barriers and acute discrimination in hiring decisions and career advancement of diverse employees. Dr. Sultana also completed her research Masters on migrant women in management in Australia at UQ Business School. She acquired her course work Masters in Management from Dhaka University in Bangladesh. She has 18 national and international conference papers. She has also published a book chapter. She continues to collaborate with her supervisors and other academics to public further papers. Dr. Sultana has been involved with the UQ Business School career mentoring program to assist students in their career development. She was a panel member at the UQ national Mental Health Week hosted by the UQ School of Law, where she provided insights on the interaction between social identity, workplace dynamics and diversity. She was a judge for the QUT Business Negotiation Competition. She has been an examiner for Honours students and reviewed papers and book chapters. Outside of academia, Dr. Sultana had her own family business for 7 years in the Hospitality Industry while she was completing her PhD and working as an academic.

Throughout the event, Dr. Sultana shared the inspiring story of her academic and professional journey along with practical insights based on her experiences and observations so far. Dr. Sultana is a very independent and determined person herself. In fact, it is her firm determination that helped her the most to progress in life despite of the thousands of difficulties and struggles she had to go through. From the early stage of her higher studies, Dr. Sultana determined to build her career in academia and till today, she has been working towards that target. In every step she took towards fulfilling her dream, she has always been inspired and supported by her family. Even her superiors, supervisors and colleagues have been very supportive to her throughout her entire journey. She firmly believes, she could not have reached where she is now and achieved whatever she has achieved so far without the support she had received in every step of her journey. So, her advice for the younger aspirants was to find balance, reach out for help and support whenever needed.

The third episode of 'NGO Talk Show' was launched on October 3, 2021 in collaboration with 'ABALAMBAN' - one of the most active government-registered NGOs of Bangladesh. The title of the show was 'Developing Bangladesh: Scope for Research between NSU and ABALAMBAN'. As the keynote speaker of the event, we had Mr. Sadequl Islam, Chairperson, ABALAMBAN NGO with us. The talk show was hosted by Mr. Mehedi Masud Sumon, Officer, OEA and Dr. Katherine Li, Director, Office of External Affairs, North South University was present as a Special Guest during the event.





As our guest Mr. Sadequl Islam is not only the current Chairperson of 'ABALAMBAN', but also one of the founder members of the organization. He shared the story, inspiration and motive behind the inception of 'ABALAMBAN' at the start of the show. The organization started its journey in 1992 with an aim to conduct voluntary work, especially for the rehabilitation of the victims of 1988 flood. 'ABALAMBAN' achieved official registration from the Bangladesh Government in 1996 and has been working to ensure proper rights and development of underprivileged and neglected people of Bangladesh. Some of the notable sectors that the organization works for are post-natural disaster damage management, women empowerment, poverty reduction, basic and cultural rights of indigenous people, etc. Mr. Islam mentioned that the organization tries to focus on long-term development goals such as establishing social equality, ensuring appropriate rights, increasing scope of education and employability for underprivileged people rather than investing in transient goals.

As a founder member of one of the oldest and most active NGOs of our country, Mr. Islam shared some insightful observations and information about the emergence and development of NGOs in Bangladesh as well as the role of NGOs in our socioeconomic growth. He mentioned that the expansion of the activities and influence of NGOs in Bangladesh mostly started after WWII in 1945 and increased widely after the Liberation War in 1971. The main focus of these NGOs has been relief and rehabilitation of underprivileged people; in other words, micro-level development. However, some of the NGOs are working towards macro-level development through activities like research, policy advocacy, etc.

During the discussion, Mr. Islam acknowledged and appreciated the research initiatives executed and planned by NSU, therefore expressed his interest in associating with NSU for joint research and publication activities in relevant areas. He also agreed to further the connection between NSU and 'ABALAMBAN' through exploring opportunities of collaboration.

The episode showcased Ms. Sirazoom Munira Silvy, a distinguished alumna of North South University from the Department of Environmental Science, Batch 2010. Ms. Silvy completed her undergraduate degree from NSU in 2014; afterwards, she received a double Masters' degree – one from the same department of NSU as her undergraduate and another from University of Durham, USA. She achieved the Chancellor's Gold Medal from North South University for her remarkable results in her Masters'. In her professional life, Ms. Silvy has worked with the Bangladesh Center for Advanced Studies and the United Nations for quite a long time. Currently, she is simultaneously working as a Program Officer at the Climate Vulnerability Forum (CVF) of Global Center on Adaption and as an Adjunct Professor for the Department of Environmental Science at NSU.



Ms. Silvy's professional journey has been very diverse and interesting so far, just as her current role at the Climate Vulnerability Forum. During the event, she granted the audience a brief glimpse into the agenda and activities of her current employer organization as well as her role as Program Officer. Ms. Silvy started with the back story of the formation of the Climate Vulnerability Forum. She mentioned that the forum includes 48 environmentally vulnerable countries and works for the betterment of climate of these regions.

As climate change is her area of expertise of Ms. Silvy, she shared her observations and thoughts about climate change and its effect on Bangladesh. According to her, Bangladesh has upgraded from vulnerable to resilient regarding climate change but is yet to lead this resilience to prosperity. She also highlighted the climate finance and climate change trust fund of Bangladesh. In this context, Ms. Silvy discussed another interesting aspect which is the activities of UNDP in our region regarding the climate change issues.

As a former student and current faculty of the same department of North South University, Ms. Silvy shared her experiences and lessons acquired from this institute while pulling off both the roles in different points of time. She emphasized the role of Department of Environmental Science, NSU on climate improvement as this platform can assure the awareness and involvement of youth in this matter.

Ms. Silvy's time at NSU as a student was interesting and challenging at the same time. She initially started her undergraduate studies in the Engineering Department, but eventually switched to Department of Environmental Science as she discovered her area of interest in this subject area. Around 13.5% of the total student pool of the university is made up of international students.




NSU Attends Dinner Meeting with University of Portsmouth, UK

Director of Enrollment Management and International Operations and Mr. Craig Fowler, Vice President of Growth, Innovation & External Relations were present during the meeting.



NSU Renews MoU with Light House, Bangladesh

North South University Office of External Affairs has been reaching out to government-registered local NGOs for potential research collaboration for a while. As an outcome of this outreach effort, NSU signed an MoU with 'Light House Bangladesh' which had expired on December 31, 2018. Recently, the OEA has organized and attended a number of meetings with the NGO to discuss the renewal of the MoU. As an outcome of these discussions, with the agreement of both parties, the MoU was renewed on October 13, 2021.

The purpose of this MoU is to promote the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) through research and practice. The MoU agrees upon carrying out joint research projects and publications, mobilization of resources for research, shared internship opportunities for students, exchange of resources like research outcomes, academic publications and information, joint trainings, workshops etc. on topics of mutual interests. The validity of this agreement is five years and shall be renewed at the end of the five-year term unless one or both of the institutions propos-

International Students' Orientation Program - Fall 2021



Prof. Tanvir Ahmed Khan is an Economist but he has widened his horizon of

thinking by pursuing the discipline of Urban and Regional Planning.

After completing his Ph.D. in Urban and Regional Planning (University of Sheffield, UK) as a Commonwealth Scholar, from Sept 1986 to Sept 1989, he landed on a journey which encompassed his presence in Donor-driven projects, his involvement in four private Universities where he rose from the position of a Registrar and Professor to the Vice-Chancellor. He has set his footprints in Bangladesh Economic Association, Bangladesh Institute of Planners, Officers Club, Gulshan North Club Ltd., Gregorian Alumni Club Lt., Rotary Club of Dhaka West, University of Dhaka (Life Registered Graduate) and the University of Sheffield Alumni.

He has wide experience in University Administration; teaching Managerial, Development, Macro and Micro Economics; Research Design and Analysis (with special emphasis on PRA and RRA); Project Planning and Analysis; Rural Development and Homestead Farming System (HFS); Poverty Alleviation, Rural Poor Programs and GO-NGO collaboration; Women in Development (W9D); Environmental Impact Assessment (E9A); and Sustainable Resource Use.



He was awarded Galpin Fellowship from Quinnipiac University, Connecticut, USA (2008); Scholarship on Agrarian Reform and Rural Development from Land Reform Training Institute (LRTI), Taiwan, Republic of China (1995), Commonwealth Scholarship, University of Sheffield, U.K., for Ph.D. (1986-89); Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) sponsorship for Course on Project Planning Analysis at University of Philippines at Los Banos, (1984); CIDA sponsorship for acting as the Resource Person to Human Settlements Division at



Asian Institute of Technology, Bangkok, Thailand (1984); UNDP Fellowship, University of Sheffield, U.K. for M.U.R.P (1977). (From the back flap of Prof. Khan's newly published book, Looking Back: The Implementation of Rural Poor Programs in Bangladesh.)

Interviewer: Where did you grow up and what was the attitude of those around you toward school(ing)?

Prof. Tanvir Ahmed Khan: I was born in old Dhaka in 1952. The town had a population of hardly 200,000 and a few vehicles. Town service buses used to ply the narrow streets and rickshaws and hackney carriages were the private service transport. The Dhaka town was in the north-south direction from Sadarghat, adjacent to the river Buriganga and all the way to Gulistan in the north. Today it has become a megalopolis with two to three crore people extending to Joydebpur in the North and Munshiganj on the south

My schooling was in St. Francis Xavier's, which was co-educational and accommodated the boys up to Class 2. From Class 3, the boys would move to St. Gregory's High School, adjacent to St. Francis. St. Gregory's had both the Bangla and the English medium of instruction.

The boys of St. Gregory's were accredited as best students in the vicinity of schools as the results of secondary school certificate examination always found the Gregorians earning excellent results. Therefore, the attitude of all those around us was always favorable.

Interviewer: Who was your role model?

Prof. Tanvir Ahmed Khan: We had a number of role models. The English teacher, Bro. Hobart Pieper CSC was an iconic figure. If there was a teacher like him in all schools, there wouldn't be any problem with our second language. Another iconic figure was our Bangla teacher, Mr. Nalini Kumar Sarker. We still remember the grammar portion since the examples he used to pose stuck to us for good. The transition to our move to hard Bangla from easy Bangla was made by Nalini sir in record time and we all earned good grades.

Interviewer: Why did you decide to pursue higher education?

Prof. Tanvir Ahmed Khan: My parents always gave higher priority to education and they instilled in us that we should all become Professors or reach equivalent positions. Much of that has become a reality. All members of my family are either Headmistress of a School, Principal of a College, Teachers in notable English medium schools, and Vice-Chancellor of a university.

Interviewer: How did you become interested in rural development?

Prof. Tanvir Ahmed Khan: My Master's thesis was on resettlement of urban squatters. To make a wholesome picture, I tried to bring in the rural poor so that I would have a clear understanding of the poor people in this country and how they are placed in society which is basically patriarchal, bourgeois-inclined, less acknowledgement of gender balance and parameters which reflect similar traits.

I was also working as an Economist in the Agriculture Sector Team (AST), a project of CIDA in the early eighties which was instrumental in preparing the Crop Agriculture Sector of the Fourth Five Year Plan. Since I went to the University of Sheffield in 1986 to do my PhD, obviously the rich substance learnt in AST had a bearing on my PhD dissertation. Later I worked in the Bangladesh Academy for Rural Development (BARD) in Comilla, the international organization which was spear-headed by no less a person as Dr. Akhter Hameed Khan, famous for the 'Comilla experiment'. He was a Magsaysay Award winner, the Asian equivalent of the Nobel Prize.

Interviewer: Tell us about your book, Looking Back, The Implementation of Rural Poor Programs in Bangladesh.

Prof. Tanvir Ahmed Khan: The PhD journey studied the initiatives of the public and private sector in the context of the alleviation of poverty of the rural poor in Bangladesh. The central thesis was that the public sector had made a significant departure at least in theory, towards the conceptualization of the rural poor programs in a way that the private sector, particularly the non-governmental organizations had been following for the past two decades.

Although it had been argued that 'moderate' NGOs like BRAC, were not institutions setting about to prove a specific model or theory of development in an absolutist sense, the study presents a 'mobilizing' NGO where the concept of 'Freire-type conscientization', a loaded concept in itself, has been seen to transcend the limits of present day thinking of moderate NGOs.

Interviewer: What made you decide to join North South University and what has been your experience so far?

Prof. Tanvir Ahmed Khan: I had been very close to Mr. M. A. Kashem, founding member of the BoT of NSU for the last 45 years. We are closely attached in the Rotary movement. Since 1992, when NSU was in its formative stage, he used to introduce me to different personalities who were working to establish private universities in Bangladesh. I taught on invitation the students of Masters in Development Studies at NSU in 2000 and 2001. I worked as a Professor and Registrar at IUB for thirteen years. Upon my retirement from IUB, I was invited to become the Vice-Chancellor of Hamdard University. I always wanted an opportunity to work with

Mr. Kashem who is a great leader in his own right. This opportunity arrived in March 2021 when he and the Vice-Chancellor of NSU proposed that I become the Executive Advisor to the VC, NSU. The objective for me to join was to strengthen the Office of the Vice-Chancellor.

The first seven months of my tenure at NSU (March to September, 2021) has been very eventful.

I could accomplish few things which I am scribing as follows for posterity:

Interviewer: What role can universities play in the development of Bangladesh?

Prof. Tanvir Ahmed Khan: Both public and private universities have been contributing greatly in human resource needs of the country. Not only in producing graduates who would become employees but also making them entrepreneurs who can establish their own companies and provide job opportunities to others. Research has been an area which was neglected since the faculty were busier in taking classes more than their usual three courses. Recently, the universities have put emphasis on research and have influenced the faculty to publish in journals accredited by Scopus so that THE (Times Higher Education) can assess their institutions. They are already in the Quacquarelli Symonds (QS) ranking.

Interviewer: What would you advise those in educational leadership positions to consider in the cultivation of global citizens?

Prof. Tanvir Ahmed Khan: Universities like NSU has so many positive attributes. Each unit has a tale to tell, but unfortunately one unit knows less of the other. Therefore, an integration of all the units have to take place and recently with the formation of the committee named 'NSU Milestone Dissemination' (NSUMD), the specific units are taking effort in showcasing their strengths and the NSUMD will be the single spokesperson.

Parallel to their studies, students should be involved in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities to sharpen their communication skills, computer skills, social skills and attributes that the employers look for.

Interviewer: What advice do you have for NSU students, faculty and staff?

Prof. Tanvir Ahmed Khan: NSU students should become global citizens. The excellent faculty at NSU have 49% PhDs from North American, UK, and Australian universities. They should not be complacent. They should take up the challenge to become a university in the first 100 world ranking.

The BoT members are providing excellent leadership and there should be more leaders like Mr. M. A. Kashem to steer the NSU ship.



Interviewer: What is a life-long dream that you still want to fulfill?

Prof. Tanvir Ahmed Khan: This is not my dream but my spouse's! She wants me to be the Secretary-General of the UN. I have no idea how she subscribed to this dream but to respect her wishes, I have kept my options open.





NH Fatima Wara completed her O' & A' levels from Mount Royal Academy. Finished a dual major in Marketing and Human Resource Management from North South University (Batch 113). In 2017 she migrated to Australia for higher studies, completing my Master of Business degree in Marketing & HR in the year 2019.

When Ms. Wara started her BBA, she officially opened her own English Medium Coaching venture back in 2011 which experienced rapid growth in a very short time. As a result, was offered job for Senior English Language Instructor position at a leading English medium school in Narayanganj, Bangladesh named ABC International School. She continued her teaching career and academics simultaneously until 2016 and chased her dream to pursue a postgraduate degree from Australia in 2017, securing a Master of Business degree from Monash University in 2019.

While doing her Master's course, Ms. Wara started working as an operations consultant at Melbourne Racing Club. With the same experience eventually ended up as a casual employee at all other racing organizations, including Victoria Racing Club, Melbourne, which is the home of the world-renowned racing carnival called the Melbourne Cup Carnival.

When Ms. Wara was closer to her Master's degree completion, she started applying for jobs in relevant sectors to build her career pathway starting as a casual Business Support Officer at a national telecommunication company called We4Us Pty Ltd which is a

subcontracting company of NBN, Telstra, Foxtel, etc. Since her interest is more in people management, she started investing in the company's people culture. In about a month's time, this effort was recognized with a promotion to directly being a National Operation Manager where her main focus was managing a diverse workforce of 200+ employees across Australia, liaising with business partners, coordinating projects and leading the admin team. This became her first full-time job right after post-grad in her career abroad.

Since Ms. Wara holds a strong interest in understanding the money market, she thought she'd want to explore the banking industry this time. And successfully landed as Loan Administrator in the Consumer Fulfilment Lending Services department where she has learnt amazing work culture, experienced diverse knowledge and still enjoys what she does as there as she was able to explore lots of professional and personal growth opportunities. At present, she is a Team Coach, Administration, Lending Services of National Australia Bank.

She has been part of the executive body as the Joint Secretary of Media & Communication of Melbourne NS Uers Association since 2017. She mentioned that it is a big pride and blessing for the NS Uers there as their senior alumni like Itekhar Uddin, Rahi Khondker, Sadia Haq, Faysal Bashar, Tamim Khan, Tanveer Masud to name a few have already set clear footprints for them to follow in different industries in Australia, constantly inspiring and assisting in shaping immigrant students' career with their success stories, support and undeniable contributions in NS Uers' community

Besides, she is a Cultural Arts Enthusiast, she often performs in and assists to organise cultural events, particularly dancing, fashion show, etc. in Melbourne where her focus is usually to celebrate Bangladeshi heritage.

Interviewer: What drove you to the banking industry? How is your experience in this sector? What are your suggestions for fresh graduates who seek a career in banking?

NH Fatima Wara: Having migrated to Australia, the abundant opportunity to explore new market/economy and cultural diversity became a great trigger to my mind to start adapting and learning new things. The thirst to learn and my innate curiosity towards trying out new adventures was the reason why I started working for different job sectors here. As a result, I became more and more inclined towards knowing how the financial system works in practice, what factors drive the economy, this time not as a customer but the one behind the system - perhaps a banker! The interest to know about the economy more than just theories drove me towards joining the banking industry.



I have been able to gather phenomenal experience from this industry here in Australia. As we all know, there are major interesting differences in the way Australian organizations, people and culture operate as compared to Bangladesh. I have had the opportunity to enjoy these organizational culture diversities through working with multicultural people who bring in a diverse pool of talents and skills. Here, I experienced how prioritizing employee health and well-being results in greater customer satisfaction because a well-taken care of employee (in terms of not only professional aspects but also mental, physical, financial, moral and social factors) produces better service naturally. The banking sector in Australia is quite agile, adaptive and technologically much more advanced than those in our country. They've contingent management plans around unexpected crises, for example COVID19, during this time because of tech advancement this sector was readily prepared to cope with the situation through introduction of work from home. I believe Bangladeshi banks still have room for improvement in the way employees' well-being and organizational contingency plans are designed.

I'd suggest aspiring graduates willing to join the banking profession to work on their soft skills like communication which will assist in stakeholder management, problem solving skills which will help with making conscious decisions; emotional intelligence through the practice of empathy and patience that can contribute in people management; willingness to self-reflect and self-challenge continuously can help keep personal and professional growth up; and, most importantly maintaining ethical professional behavior at all times, because honesty is highly valued in any profession, especially in Australian organizational culture. Regarding technical knowledge, mostly it's transferred through regular on-the-job training but some industrial knowledge is required which can be derived from our relevant academic and online certification accomplishments.

Interviewer: How did you get involved in the racing industry in Australia? Please share the story.

NH Fatima Wara: It was quite an exciting memory. Our main target when we migrated to Melbourne, Australia was to get into a local job preferably in an industry which is locally popular. Racing (Sports) is a heritage that Australians take pride in which unites the whole nation just like the sensation we have about cricket in our country! The very first job that we applied for (through a job portal) was in a popular racing club called Melbourne Racing Club which was luckily 2 minutes away from our residence in Melbourne. It was like the cherry on top of cake! Reference to this local experience in a well-known industry served as a foundation for us qualifying for all other racing clubs as employee in the operations department, which in turn not only helped us quickly adapt to Aussie culture, values and lifestyle but also catered as a big boost to our next job application.

Interviewer: Please tell us about your social work activities. How did you become passionate about them?

NH Fatima Wara: I have been doing social work ever since I became financially independent back in the year 2010. I'm comfortable keeping this a bit private as I'm a believer of our religious ideology regarding charity that, 'charity should be such that when right hand donates, left hand must not know'. However, this belief seems to have slightly evolved as I have been advised by a lot of my seniors who have seen me perform community work that sharing the things I do could inspire others which in turn can benefit a greater number of people in our society. Hence, I am sharing that I have contributed in under-privileged children's education through direct teaching, created job opportunities for disadvantaged groups in my own venture and in other companies. I usually perform career counselling for students and assist international students with job-hunting, internships to employment journey with my own experience and through help of my seniors who are highly successful in their own fields here. During this pandemic, I've been able to personally support international students in whatever capacity I can whenever possible as well as create network between them and charitable organizations so that they can get help when I am unable to afford it myself. I'm thankful to each and every one who came forward in solidarity to my personal efforts to stand by international students in hardship in my network during this hard time.

The credit of my passion to serve the community goes to my beloved father who dedicated his entire life for people's welfare and my family who has always strongly cherished the practice of social work. I inherited this from my family and this is something which I truly feel from inside. If we care for each other in need, or even in no need, the world would be a better place for us all. Only if we knew positivity can drive us a long way, bring us a peaceful life and unite us in one big platform that things would be much simpler. It can be hard as there are factors that may discourage us, but if it's a natural passion and we find spiritual peace in it, it can become strongly active in our everyday lifestyle - which can't be helped.

Interviewer: What things should the students focus on if he/she wants to get into an Australian university, preferably with a good scholarship?

NH Fatima Wara: Scholarship opportunities are quite competitive and are generally based on academic merit. Students who aim for top universities in Australia like University of Melbourne, Monash University, University of NSW, University of Sydney, should primarily focus on scoring decent academic results. A good CGPA can contribute to the likelihood of qualifying for reputed universities and for being granted a scholarship. The scholarship opportunities, however, vary based on government grant rules and regulations in the territory and the education provider (universities or academic institutes) that a student is applying for. For instance, Master by Research/PhD provides scholarships to international students. Other subjects like Master of Information Technology, Business, Medical Science, and Engineering usually provide scholarships which contribute to a small percentage of the whole course tuition fees. However, all these depend on the applicant's eligibility and scholarship availability from the university for which the student applies. It is a good idea to check scholarship eligibility online and extensively research the academic requirements, tuition fees and post-migration factors like accommodation (living costs), etc. prior to applying for higher studies so that a student can make an effective decision.



The best way to start preparing is through consulting an expert migration agency like Shaheda Higher Education Consultancy-SHEC (that I applied through) or IDP that can provide customized guidance based on a student's need and background check.

Interviewer: Tell us about the latest events and activities of Melbourne NSUers. How can an alumni association help the student community on foreign soil?

NH Fatima Wara: Due to impact of COVID, Melbourne NSUers have been unable to initiate any events as we've been in lockdown on and off over the last 2 years except for a few effective community calls to support our fellow NSUers during this challenging time. However, we usually host events like 'Career Development Workshop', 'Annual Sports Day', 'Alumni Talk' with distinguished guests from our Alma Mater, 'Annual Cultural Event', 'Social Get Together' like picnics or BBQs, etc. to keep our NSUer community united and active in Melbourne.

In a foreign land, knowing an organization connected to our home side, our university or nationality is an advantage itself. And when that organization consists of people we can look up to, rely on, consult with or simply connect to at times of personal or professional need, it becomes an undeniable blessing. Joining Melbourne NSUers when I first migrated here for my post-grad made me feel I'm at home, connected to NSU and taken care of by my seniors who are exemplary. I must say an alumni association does contribute to an immigrant student's cultural adaptation, career, mental health and to some extent the settlement process too through their generous act of charitable community work.

Interviewer: What inspired you to choose North South University for your postgraduate studies among all other universities of Bangladesh?

Jia Jipeng: As an international student from China currently studying NSU, I think the NSU delivers a wide range of high-quality education with a well-respected reputation and provides superior education services to all students. Besides that, NSU is first private and one of the largest independent higher education providers in Bangladesh as well as highly recognized in local and global wide.

Interviewer: You have received your undergraduate degree in Chemistry & Materials and are pursuing postgraduate in Business Administration. What was the factors that influenced this switch in field of study?

Jia Jipeng: In line with the government directives to cope with the COVID-19 pandemic and keep students safe, the NSU has decided to operate the online education activities. Since I was admitted in the Summer semester of 2021, I have experienced the online classes under the terrible circumstance induced by COVID-19. I think it is suitable for current situations, easy for students to study, and also can ensure all students and faculty members safe. During this period, we are studying and interacting with faculties and classmates very well online, all classes are continuously and smoothly going on, no negative effects for me to gain the knowledge.

Interviewer: You have been staying in Bangladesh for almost two years. What is your opinion and observations about the people and culture of Bangladesh? How do you like it here?

Jia Jipeng: I have visited 7 countries in past few years, among them I do like Bangladeshi people and culture more than others. I have been living here for 2 years and have a special feeling for Bangladesh. The people of Bangladesh are kind-hearted, honest, courageous, persevering and persistent, and happy to help others, moreover, they always like to keep sincere and sweet smile to others, I think it is the most beautiful smile in the world, deeply branded in my heart and I would never forget it.

Interviewer: Anything you want to share with or suggest to the future applicant of NSU?

Jia Jipeng: Firstly, I would like to take this opportunity to express my gratitude and respect to NSU, and wish it will grow more and more prosperous in future. As a student currently studying in NSU, I hope that more numbers of future applicants from abroad and local will come to the NSU for the higher education.
