Collaboration Meeting with Assumption University, Thailand

he Office of External Affairs at NSU hosted a fruitful collaboration meeting with Assumption University in Thailand on January 09, 2023. The meeting's purpose was to explore possible areas of collaboration and renew the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with NSU. The institutions were enthusiastic about extending and expanding their partnership as they had previously collaborated in several areas.

The School of Health and Life Sciences at NSU attracted the attention of Assumption University. They proposed collaborating on research projects and faculty exchange programs. They also intended to send a Thai student to NSU to complete his undergraduate education, which can strengthen the student's university experience and enrich their cultural exposure. Exploring credit transfer and summer schools was another matter of interest for both universities. Such programs will offer students a diversified academic experience, enhance their skill set, and expose them to different cultures. It will increase the universities' collaboration, create opportunities for faculty and student exchange programs, and encourage joint research and academic activities. The partnership will foster learning, educational advancement, and cultural awareness among university students, teachers, and staff. Therefore, renewing the MoU with NSU will benefit both universities. The meeting established the foundation for an exciting and beneficial collaboration between NSU and Assumption University.

The one-hundred-and-sixth episode of the NSU Alumni Talk
Show was aired on January 11, 2023. The guest for this episode was Dr.
Mehree Iqbal, of batch 2005 from the School of Business and Economics.
Dr. Mehree Iqbal is a highly accomplished professional with diverse qualifications and experiences. She graduated from North South University
(NSU) in 2009 with a Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA). She
graduated from NSU in 2009 and continued her pursuit of excellence by

obtaining her Masters of Business Administration (MBA) from the University of Glasgow in 2011 and then a PhD from Curtin University in 2022. Her academic achievements are a testament to her dedication and hard work, Her impressive educational background and varied experiences have made her a highly sought-after professional. Dr. Iqbal is associated with the School of Business and Economics of North South University, where she has worked since 2012. She is a dedicated faculty member and has been actively involved in various teaching and research activities. Her commitment to teaching and research has made her a respected member of the academic community.

The show commenced with a discussion about Dr. Iqbal's academic and professional life. Dr. Mehree Iqbal joined NSU in 2005 to pursue her undergraduate degree in BBA after completing high school. Her excellence at the admission exam got her a merit-based scholarship upon entering NSU. During her last year of undergraduate studies, Dr. Iqbal worked as a Teaching Assistant for a year and completed an internship at British-American Tobacco (BAT). Then in 2010, she graduated from NSU and enrolled for an MBA in International Business and Entrepreneurship, for which she received a post-graduate excellence scholarship and graduated with distinction in 2011. Upon returning to Bangladesh, Dr. Iqbal joined NSU as a lecturer on the new campus in 2012. She actively researched with her colleagues on tech adaptations, the theory of planned behavior, consumer behaviors along with their intentions and transformation and so on. Later in 2016, Dr. Mehree Iqbal was promoted to the Senior Lecturer for publishing in numerous journals. A year later, in 2017, Dr. Iqbal received the Australian Government Scholarship to pursue her doctoral research degree at Curtin University, Australia. She completed her PhD in social entrepreneurship based in Bangladesh and worked with the students and their behaviors to become social entrepreneurs. After completing her PhD, Dr. Iqbal's outstanding thesis received the Dean's Recommendation from the reviewers in 2022. She then returned to Bangladesh and rejoined NSU as an Assistant Professor for both BBA and MBA students to participate in the more considerable change that NSU aims to make.

Dr. Iqbal discussed her experience during her doctoral studies in Australia and why she focused on International Business. She always wanted to get a PhD degree and narrowed down her focus area when she started publishing journals. During her undergraduate studies, she enjoyed her international business courses and took as many as she could as electives, believing that it is essential for today's world to know the relevant situation of the current world. She received a scholar-ship from the Australian government for her merits, and her PhD focused on Social Entrepreneurship and Entrepreneurial Behavior. For prospective PhD students with an interest in getting scholarships, CGPA is a single criterion that helps, but research capabilities and experiences are what give a student an edge over others, according to Dr. Iqbal, as well as an interest in a particular topic. She advises that students should know they are qualified with the skill and the knowledge; they need to nurture it to bloom and succeed.

Dr. Iqbal is a professor who shares a passion for teaching with her family, viewing it as a highly gratifying and fulfilling occupation that offers immense personal contentment. She finds instructing students both challenging and invigorating and sees it as a means of maintaining a connection to the realm of academia. For those who relish learning, teaching can be a way to keep abreast of the latest developments in their field. Professors constantly engage in research, investigate new concepts, and stay current with the latest research. This can make the job incredibly enriching as it allows professors the opportunity to remain at the forefront of their field. Dr. Iqbal perceives teaching as an opportunity to assist others and further noted how professors have the potential to shape the intellects of young people and serve as guides. With the appropriate approach, professors can impart their knowledge and instill a lifelong love of learning in their students. This requires dedication, fortitude, and extraordinary forbearance. Additionally, Dr. Iqbal values the chance to form close relationships with students, other faculty members, and staff, which has resulted in a strong sense of purpose and community for many teaching faculties, including herself. Ultimately, the love and respect one receives, and the contributions one makes to the community are incomparable to Dr. Iqbal.

In the last part of the show, Dr. Iqbal briefly reflects on her positive experience during her undergraduate studies at NSU. She considers the opportunities at NSU boundless and regrets not being more involved in extracurricular activities, which she believes provide valuable networking and skill development opportunities. She is an alumna of NSU's Sanskritik Sangathan club, but her prime focus was always her studies. She regrets missing out on club activities that teach negotiation, professionalism, interpersonal skills, punctuality, understanding, and many more skills. She emphasized the importance of balancing academic and extracurricular activities. Dr. Iqbal fondly remembers her favorite teachers and their support in encouraging her to pursue her dreams. She believes that having a mentor during one's undergraduate studies is crucial in shaping a student's development, and she feels that her work is not a chore but something she enjoys. She feels a sense of familiarity and comfort at NSU that is irreplaceable to her.

Bangladesh Institute of Social Research Trust

The twenty-eighth episode of the 'Talk Show' aired on January 12, 2023 with one of the government-registered research organizations and the leading private think-tank of Bangladesh - Bangladesh Institute of Social Research (BISR) Trust. The title of the event was

"Developing Bangladesh: Scope for Research with Bangladesh Institute of Social Research (BISR) Trust". The keynote speaker for this episode was Dr. M. Khurshed Alam, Chairman Bangladesh Institute of Social Research (BISR) Trust. From North South University (NSU), Dr. Katherine Li, Director, Office of External Affairs, was present as a Special Guest and Mr. Mehedi Masud Sumon, Officer, OEA, hosted the live talk show.

The event started with a brief introduction of the guest including his academic and professional background. Dr. M. Khurshed Alam is a highly regarded social scientist in South Asia and the founding Chairman of the Bangladesh Institute of Social Research (BISR) Trust. He holds a Ph.D. in Sociology and has extensive working experience with national and international agencies such as the World Bank, ADB, JICA, and UNICEF on various initiatives including poverty alleviation, rural development, gender equality and disaster management. Dr. Alam has been a National Expert of the Planning Commission in Bangladesh and held senior positions in the Water Resources Ministry, DFID, and GiZ, leading multiple study and evaluation projects. He is highly regarded for his contributions to the fields of society and development, notably for his notions and theories on poverty alleviation, governance, and the function of the populace in democracies. Dr. Alam serves on the editorial board of the BMC Women's Health Journal, acts as a referee for a multitude of prominent academic publications, and assesses Ph.D. theses at prestigious universities across the globe.

Dr. Alam presented a brief introduction about the Bangladesh Institute of Social Research (BISR) Trust during the show including its founding history, mission and several research projects and initiatives. He addressed the challenges encountered during the organization's establishment particularly, the stipulation for more

funding and skilled researchers. BISR is a non-profit, non-partisan think tank that was developed in 2003 with the objective of promoting social improvement through research and other endeavors. BISR Trust has conducted significant studies on a wide range of topics including socioeconomic development, environmental issues, livelihoods, human rights, governance, marginalized groups, criminal activity, and participation of women in sports, public health, institutional development, and other crucial issues in Bangladesh. Many international reputable journal institutions have published the findings of BISR Trust. For the advancement of the nation, Dr. Alam highlighted the importance of public, private, and international research investment.

Dr. Alam additionally emphasized the significant contributions of the government-registered research institutes for the development of the nation. He commended the role played by organizations like BID and BISR Trust in carrying out credible research studies and reminded that these organizations frequently operate like NGOs with clear objectives that generate positive results. Dr. Alam highlighted the need for a greater emphasis on industrial research and the use of local resources to compete in overseas markets despite significant advances in agricul-



tural research. He also called for establishing existing policies for collaboration between government and private organizations in research contrasting this with the well-defined policies of sponsorship and collaboration in industries abroad.

The guest speaker, Dr. Alam, addressed the organization's initiatives and strategies for effective research during the event's final part and underlined the necessity of creating research guidelines in Bangladesh. He noted the limitations of action research and the progress made in commissioned research and emphasized the recognition of the researchers and the creation of more research-related facilities for doing research. He further mentioned the BISR Trust's affiliations with universities and enthusiasm in collaborations for joint research and learning. Dr. Alam also cited the BISR Trust's tradition of working with academics from reputable public and private universities, offering practical training and education in research methodology.

NSU Delegation Visit to University of Calcutta, India

One of Bangladesh's leading private universities, North South University, has made tremendous progress in fostering academic and scientific partnerships with prominent institutions and universities throughout the globe. From January 11 to 15, 2023, a delegation headed by the respected Vice-Chancellor, Professor Dr. Atiqul Islam, along with Professor Dr. Sharif Uddin Ahmed, the former Chairman of the History and Philosophy department, and Dr. Hasanuzzaman, the Assistant Director of the Office of External Affairs (OEA) visited Kolkata, India, to meet with administrators of prominent universities and institutions for academic and research partnership. NSU's Office of External Affairs has actively pursued outreach measures to establish bilateral connections with reputable institutions worldwide, resulting in more than 200 MoUs. During the expedition, the delegation visited three institutes, including the University of Calcutta, the Victoria Memorial Ha

The University of Calcutta is the first multidisciplinary, secular Western-style university in the South Asian region, founded in 1857 by the British Government. The MoU signing ceremony between NSU and the University of Calcutta ensued on January 13, 2023 after productive discussions on partnership in educational, research, and cultural interactions. Key features of the MoU comprise student-faculty exchanges, joint research, publication opportunities, organizing joint seminars, symposiums, workshops, and cultural interactions through collaborative activities. During the visit, the Vice-Chancellor of NSU delivered a public speech on the Recent History and Economic Development of South Asia with particular reference to Bangladesh, which was highly applauded. The lecture was attended by senior academicians, professors, researchers, and university students and was followed by an exciting Question & Answer session.

The NSU team also paid a visit to the Victoria Memorial Hall, a museum dedicated solely to Queen Victoria's legacy and exhibiting cultural and historical artifacts from the British Raj. The delegation, which included representatives from the Department of History and Philosophy, met with Dr. Jayanta Sengupta, the Secretary & Curator of VMH. The visit aimed to explore the

possibility of signing an MoU between VMH and NSU, which would allow NSU students and researchers to benefit from the museum's resources. The Victoria Memorial, built between 1906 and 1921, is a grand marble structure on the Maidan that serves as a museum for Indian history and culture.

In addition, the NSU delegation met with the Managing Director, Ms. Darshan Mekani Shah, and explored the Weavers Studio Resource Center, a Kolkata-based research institute, to assess collaborative possibilities in textile research, publication, and international cooperation encompassing Bengal textiles. The center aims to revive and reproduce some of the most outstanding qualities of textiles produced in the region in the past, such as Muslins. The delegation headed to the textile museum, which houses the world's most extraordinary collection of renowned Muslin clothing in various styles and qualities.

Overall, this official trip successfully established a substantial academic and research collaboration between North South University and the University of Calcutta. The MoU signing and the Vice-Chancellor's lecture will undoubtedly facilitate a deeper understanding and appreciation of the cultural and academic resemblances and differences between Bangladesh and India, leading to more extensive collaborations in the future.


BdAF Scholarship Recipients 2nd Quarterly Meetup with Students

Introductory Meeting between Pathfinder International, Bangladesh

On January 16, 2023, NSU arranged an introductory meeting with Pathfinder International, Bangladesh. The meeting was conducted online, and it was attended by Dr. Katherine Li, Director, Office of External Affairs (OEA), NSU; Mr. Mahbub Alam, Country Director, Pathfinder International, Bangladesh; Dr. Sharmin Sultana, Technical Director, Pathfinder International, Bangladesh; Mr. Sohrab Hussain, Project Manager, (re)solve, Pathfinder

International, Bangladesh; Ms. Marufa Khan, Manager, Knowledge Management, Pathfinder International, Bangladesh; Dr. Mohammad Delwer Hossain Hawlader, Associate Professor & Chair, Dept. of Public Health, NSU; Dr. Md. Mainul Hossain, Associate Professor & Chair, Dept. of Biochemistry and Microbiology, and Research Coordinator, School of Health & Life Sciences, NSU, and Mr. Mehedi Masud Sumon, Officer, (OEA), NSU.

The meeting was chaired by Dr. Katherine Li, Director of External Affairs (OEA). Mr. Mahbub Alam, Country Director of Pathfinder International, Bangladesh, expressed gratitude for the invitation to explore potential collaboration between NSU and Pathfinder International, Bangladesh. Mr. Alam briefly introduced the organization, a US-based international organization known for its expertise in sexual and reproductive health, particularly family planning, in over 20 countries worldwide. He explained that Pathfinder International, Bangladesh, has been partnering with the Government of Bangladesh since 1978 to ensure access to contraception for even the hardest-to-reach communities.

Pathfinder International, Bangladesh is currently implementing the USAID-funded "Shukhi Jibon" project in 32 districts across eight divisions, as well as the "Women Led Climate Resilience" program in 5 districts of Bangladesh. The latter program integrates sexual and reproductive health with climate change and disaster management activities at the community level, a groundbreaking approach funded by Takeda Pharmaceutical Company Limited. Additionally, Pathfinder International,



Bangladesh, has a small project for the Rohingya community in Cox's Bazar, which focuses on SRHR activities for both the Rohingya and the host community. In addition to this, Pathfinder International, Bangladesh has implemented other vital projects, including the "Smiling Sun" urban initiative project, which was branded and successfully completed in 2018. Pathfinder International, Bangladesh, has offices in Dhaka, Chittagong, Mymensingh, and Sylhet and co-located staff in all 32 districts. Dr. Sultana elaborated on the organization's ongoing initiatives. She explained that in addition to the "Shukhi Jibon" project, Pathfinder International, Bangladesh, provides technical support to improve the accessibility and availability of family planning services for women. The organization is also working towards capacity development and providing clinical services. Another key focus is on adolescent health, which includes adolescent-friendly services. Pathfinder International, Bangladesh, supports the government in these areas and works towards standardizing the content of government curricula and manuals. The organization is also working on digital technology training to raise awareness and monitor services. Furthermore, Mr. Hussain highlighted their current focus on adolescents and youth due to their vulnerability to SRHR-related and public health issues. Collaborating with North South University (NSU) and its experienced faculty members, researchers, and a large youth population would enable both parties to research positive SRHR practices, particularly in sexual and reproductive health. Ms. Khan expressed her interest in partnership with NSU and utilizing the young, energetic students for the flagship project. She also proposed being an intellectual partner with NSU, offering opportunities for NSU students to intern and prepare informative documents.

During the meeting, Dr. Hawlader proposed several areas of collaboration between NSU and Pathfinder International, Bangladesh, including research, joint publications, research funding, and student internship programs. He expressed interest in creating an effective partnership between the two organizations to benefit NSU students and faculty members. Dr. Hossain added that NSU's Public Health Department, led by an expert in this area, could partner with Pathfinder International, Bangladesh, to promote joint research, exchange research outcomes, and facilitate joint training workshops. Dr. Li noted that NSU's robust research infrastructure, expert faculty, and Career and Placement Center (CPC) would facilitate successful research collaboration, joint publications, research projects, and training and internship opportunities. Dr. Hawlader requested the Director of External Affairs to formulate a draft memorandum of understanding between the two organizations.

Alumni Talk Show Episode 107



The one-hundred-and-seventh episode of the NSU Alumni Talk Show was aired on January 23, 2023. The guest for this episode was Md. Alim Ul Karim from batch 2011 of the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering, majoring in Computer Science and Engineering. Md. Alim Ul Karim is a highly accomplished software engineer and technical professional with over 17 years of experience in the field of programming. He has an exceptional record of technical expertise, coupled with strong leadership skills, having held several key positions throughout his career. Currently, Mr. Karim is working as the Principal Software Engineer of Validata Group, Greece.

The show began with a synopsis of Mr. Karim's professional and academic life. Md. Alim UI Karim is a highly skilled software engineer and technical expert with over a decade and a

half of programming experience. He is accredited for his strong leadership skills, having held positions such as CTO, Full-Stack Architect, System Analyst, Software Engineer, and Programmer. Mr. Karim is a highly recognized mentor for C#.NET Architects Bootcamp at Crossover, where only the most exceptional talent is recruited. His extensive expertise in .NET and VB programming has led to the co-creation of the 'C# Automatic Unit Test Framework' at Crossover, restructuring how code is analyzed. In addition, Mr. Karim has developed a state-of-the-art static code analyzer tool that can forecast code coverage for each pattern in the catalog without even running the device. His comprehensive skill set includes excellence in API, Jenkins, C#, .NET Framework, Java, Scala, ASP.NET, Git/SVN, Angular, AWS Stack, PowerShell, and more. He has worked at noteworthy enterprises such as Crossover, Evatix, Relisource, and Enosis.

During the show, Mr. Karim provided valuable advice to current Computer Science and Engineering students and graduates. He discussed the importance of embracing Artificial Intelligence in one's professional journey and advised students to acquire proficiency in various programming languages to enhance their skills and market value. Mr. Karim recommended committing to one language for 3-4 years to ensure comprehensive understanding and mastery. He highlighted the demand for languages such as Java, Python, and JavaScript in the market for CSE students and graduates. He also spoke about his experience seeking guidance from a senior colleague who encouraged him to delve into AI. Finally, Mr. Karim emphasized that AI requires human intelligence to be directed effectively for optimal results and dispelled the misconception that AI will replace human effort and capabilities.

As the show progressed, Mr. Karim spoke about the global influence of technology during the COVID-19 crisis. Despite reports of a temporary slowdown in the sector, which resulted in job losses for some, he emphasized the success of companies such as Netflix, whose value surpassed Disney due to the surge in over-the-top platforms. He encouraged against disregarding the technology sector during periods of decline, as he believes that this is the ideal time to invest with a deep comprehension of the emotional, engineering, business, and value factors of the market and the capability to make strategic predictions and plans. Mr. Karim boasts exceptional summarizing abilities and emphasizes the importance of focusing on key elements, utilizing mind-mapping techniques with the aid of color coding and concise wording. He suggests seeking out training resources readily available on the internet.

Mr. Karim discussed his reasons for choosing North South University (NSU) for his Computer Science studies. He realized the value of NSU and chose it due to its prompt recognition of North American degrees by the World Education Services (WES) and favorable QS ranking. Despite his unsuccessful attempt to join the computer science club at NSU, Mr. Karim had a supportive network of friends who helped him with his studies and maintained excellent grades. He balanced work and other commitments and received a job offer from a welcoming professor at the university. He built strong relationships with professors, including one who served as his thesis advisor, resulting in a national newspaper publication. Ultimately, Mr. Karim described NSU as a congenial and stimulating environment to learn and socialize.

At the show's end, Mr. Karim mentioned that he recently considered pursuing an MSc. degree. He noted that numerous universities in the USA recognize NSU, which holds accreditation in the USA as well. The only hindrance is the prerequisite for IELTS and language proficiency tests. Despite this, NSU boasts a highly esteemed reputation. He concluded the show by encouraging students to start early on business or work to exemplify their abilities and be ahead of their peers. He also emphasized the importance of training oneself prior to embarking on academic studies.

Through setting up a center for corporate sustainability and child rights, the MoU aspires to undertake joint activities in advocacy, incubation and networking, knowledge management, and capacity development. A decade ago, UN9CEF, the UN Global Compact and Save the Children, developed the Child Rights and Business Principles (CRBP) - a voluntary framework for businesses. The CRBPs were the first tool to clearly articulate how corporate responsibility to respect children's rights can be realized in the workplace, marketplace, community, and environment. These principles direct companies on how to mitigate detrimental effects on children while maximizing the positive effects that activities and business partnerships may have on children and youth. Addressing global challenges requires putting children's rights at the center of sustainability and responsible business practices. And though the corporate world has made huge strides in incorporating children's rights over the last decade, there is still a long way to go.



Based on this premise, on February 01, 2023 a national symposium was convened in the Syndicate Hall of North South University with support from the Office of External Affairs (OEA). Nepal Student Recruitment Meeting

North South University (NSU) is considered one of the most prominent universities in Bangladesh, and Nepal is a substantial market for international students. Authorities can take various measures to increase the number of Nepalese students at NSU. On February 08, 2023, a meeting was convened with the distinguished members, including Directors, Deans, and Chairpersons of various departments at NSU to address the challenges of recruiting Nepalese students and devise potential solutions to overcome them. The meeting was attended by Dr. M. Ismail Hossain, Pro Vice-Chancellor, Treasurer; Dr. Ahmed Tazmeen, Registrar; Professor Sk. Tawfique M. Haque, Director, South Asian Institute of Policy and Governance (SIPG); Dr. Abdur Rob Khan, Professor and Dean, School of Humanities & Social Sciences; Dr. Javed Bari, Professor and Dean, School of Engineering & Physical Sciences; Dr. Hasan Mahmud Reza, Professor and Dean, School of Health and Life Sciences (SHLS);

One effective way is to invest in promotional material. Engaging in promotional material can create more awareness about NSU among Nepalese students and encourage them to apply. A well-crafted marketing campaign, which highlights NSU's unique strengths and opportunities, can attract more students. One of the primary approaches is the development of targeted promotional materials that highlight the benefits of attending NSU, including its academic programs, cultural programs, and affordable cost of living. These materials will be designed to appeal to Nepalese students and distributed through appropriate media to reach potential applicants.

Another factor that can play a crucial role in recruiting Nepalese students is budget allocation. NSU can allocate an increased budget towards promoting NSU in Nepal. This can involve hosting education fairs and seminars to provide a platform for students to learn more about NSU and its offerings. By investing in targeted advertising campaigns, education fairs, and other promotional events, NSU can effectively reach Nepalese students and demonstrate its commitment to attracting international talent. The Nepal embassy can be a vital partner in this regard. An education fair can be organized inside the embassy premises, or a suitable location outside can be hired to host the event. This will require a coordinated effort across multiple departments at NSU and stakeholders to ensure that resources are allocated efficaciously.

One key challenge in recruiting Nepalese students is the reliance on education consultants to facilitate the application and enrollment process. While NSU does not allow such education consultants to operate on campus, it is still important to engage with reputable education consultants who can help connect prospective students with the university. NSU can collaborate with education consultants who are popular in Nepal to reach out to more Nepalese students. However, the university should be vigilant in vetting these education consultants, as some education consultants may need to be more legitimate. NSU can verify the authenticity of education consultants by consulting alums residing in Nepal who can provide reliable information about their legitimacy.

Furthermore, NSU can offer scholarships to Nepalese students to attract them to NSU. Scholarships are highly attractive to students and can act as an incentive for them to apply. Currently, NSU has ten scholarship students, which can be increased to attract more Nepalese students. These scholarships will be advertised through education consultants or alumni residing in Nepal or appropriate channels and distributed to eligible applicants fairly and transparently. The aim is to demonstrate NSU's commitment to excellence and to attract the best and brightest students from Nepal.

NSU's significant impediment in recruiting Nepalese students is verifying their submitted educational documents. Nepalese educational documents are often in languages other than English, making verification challenging. In such cases, NSU can consult the embassy or high commission to verify documents and ensure they meet NSU's requirements. Additionally, NSU should be careful in processing applications and ensure that students' educational documents meet the university's requirements before accepting them while verifying education consultants' legitimacy through alumni residing in Nepal.

NSU should also focus on internationalizing the university and attracting Nepalese students interested in public health, microbiology, and biochemistry. By creating programs tailored to the Nepalese market, NSU can attract more students from Nepal. NSU can also learn from previous case studies to understand how

Nepalese students operate and tailor its recruitment strategies accordingly. The university will also offer spot admissions to qualified applicants at these events, demonstrating its commitment to recruiting the best and brightest students from Nepal. NSU will participate in education fairs in Nepal to further support recruitment efforts, both within and outside the embassy premises. This will allow NSU to showcase its academic programs and facilities to prospective students and their families. The COVID-19 pandemic has led to a decline in Nepalese student applications to NSU. However, NSU can increase the number of Nepalese students by investing in promotional materials, offering scholarships, and working with authentic education consultants. Furthermore, NSU can collaborate with the Nepal embassy and high commission to verify educational documents and ensure students meet NSU's requirements.

In conclusion, increasing the number of Nepalese students at NSU requires a coordinated effort across multiple departments and stakeholders. By investing in targeted promotional materials, allocating sufficient budgetary resources, engaging with reputable agents, offering scholarships, verifying documents, and participating in education fairs, NSU can effectively reach Nepalese students and demonstrate its commitment to diversifying and internationalization with excellence.

Speak Up for the Poor



On February 15, 2023, North South University (NSU) and Speak Up for the Poor convened a successful introductory meeting. Dr. Katherine Li, the Director of the NSU's Office of External Affairs (OEA), Mr. Troy Anderson, the Founder and International Director of Speak Up for the Poor, and Mr. Mehedi Masud Sumon, Officer in the OEA, all participated in the meeting. Dr. Li chaired the meeting and expressed her enthusiasm for active learning. She emphasized how standard textbook learning education systems provide students with few practical possibilities. The main discussions included prospects for research collaboration, joint publishing, training, and internships.

After that, Mr. Troy Anderson briefly introduced Speak Up for the Poor, a US-based international organization established in 2004 that empowers underprivileged girls through education.

To keep girls in school and break the cycle of deprivation and child marriage, it officially began operating in Bangkok, Thailand, in 2008. It implemented the Girls Education Program (GEP) in Khulna Division, Bangladesh, in 2012. The project collaborates with families and communities to transform how society perceives and comprehends impoverished girls and recognizes their potential. According to Speak Up for the Poor, the greatest way to overcome injustice and impoverishment is by educating and empowering underprivileged girls. As of January 2023, the organization had financed 1,570 girls' educations in numerous villages and urban regions in western Bangladesh's Khulna district. The majority of these girls are Dalits or severely poor Muslim girls, who are among the most marginalized and destitute subgroups in the country. Sponsors of Speak Up for the Poor contribute \$40 monthly to help finance each girl's education, including daily tutoring, books and school supplies, and monthly seminars. The GEP gives girls a step-by-step strategy for reaching their long-term goals, assisting them in navigating the problematic route to academic achievement and opposing child marriage. Many young girls aim to be teachers, nurses, physicians, and other professionals to help their disadvantaged neighborhoods. GEP makes it possible for them to pursue their dreams.

Dr. Li subsequently emphasized the university's research strengths and encouraged collaboration between the two research institutions. Before pursuing the partnership, Mr. Anderson approved another conference with experienced academics from NSU. Joint publications, research activities, training, internships, and submitting collaborative research proposals for external funds are examples of possible collaboration. NSU is the ideal match for research collaboration since it has a highly integrated Office of Research and qualified faculty members in a broad range of disciplines.

Follow-up Meeting with BISR Trust



North South University (NSU) arranged a follow-up meeting with BISR Trust on February 20, 2023. The meeting was attended by Dr. M. Khurshed Alam, Chairman, Bangladesh Institute of Social Research (BISR) Trust; Prof. Dr. M. A. Farukh, Adjunct Researcher, Bangladesh Institute of Social Research (BISR) Trust; Ms. Navira Azmi, Communication &

Research Officer, Bangladesh Institute of Social Research (BISR) Trust; Professor Sk, Tawfique M. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss potential academic collaboration between North South University (NSU) and BISR Trust by examining the activities of BISR Trust and suggesting areas for partnership between the two institutions. The outcome of the meeting was an agreement to start an academic collaboration through a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between NSU and BISR Trust.

The meeting commenced with Dr. M. Khurshed Alam, Chairman of the Bangladesh Institute of Social Research (BISR) Trust, providing attendees with background information on the Trust's establishment in 2002 as an independent, non-profit, non-partisan, multi-disciplinary think tank. The Trust's primary purpose is to research fundamental development challenges in Bangladesh, with an emphasis on the social economy in specific. Dr. Alam highlighted that the BISR Trust has partnered with national and international organizations on gender and social challenges. He noted the Trust's significant accomplishments, such as collaborating with prominent international funding bodies and establishing a global scholar community. Dr. Alam also discussed the research divisions of the BISR Trust, including social and gender issues, economic issues, business, industry, and labor concerns, environmental and climate change issues, and criminal justice and human rights issues. Dr. Alam expressed an intention to establish a Memorandum of Understanding with NSU, which might help with large-scale projects, and the organization has a great interest in partnering with North American and European partners on international research initiatives.



Prof. Haque appreciated the future partnership and stressed the advantages of a consortium relationship. NSU has experienced social researchers and faculty members who undertake research that is published nationally and globally. Prof. Haque underlined the significance of practical, field-based experiences in conducting successful international research projects, and he outlined prospects for collaborative research and publications, resource and funding mobilization, student internships, and the interchange of research findings and academic information. He added that integrating NSU's experience in social issues with BISR Trust's concentration areas will create a win-win situation for both parties. Following a thorough discussion, the two parties agreed to establish an Agreement to launch their academic partnership. This collaboration will involve joint research projects, publications, and funding proposals. Moreover, this collaboration will provide NSU students with training and internship opportunities.


North South University (NSU) and St. John's University had a collaboration meeting on the 07th of February 2023 to

International Faculty Feature



Samishka Koirala is an Assistant Professor of Journalism and Media at North South University in Dhaka, Bangladesh. As a journalism educator and researcher, she has worked with Tribhuvan University, Nepal Open University, Oslomet University, and different UN agencies. In 2018, she completed her Ph.D. in Journalism and Gender from the University of Oslo, Norway. Similarly, she completed her master's degree in Journalism, Media, and Communication from the University of Dhaka. She has led and conducted various studies on gender and journalism, digital harassment, gender equality, and the safety of journalists. Her journal article on digital harassment was featured in multiple news media and has been cited in different policy documents of the different INGOs, the government of Nepal, and United Nations agencies. As a former advisor to the Minister of Women, Children, and Senior Citizens, Nepal (2020-2021), she continues to serve as a think tank member at the ministry. Prior to entering academia, she was a full-time journalist working with the national daily Republica in Kathmandu. She started my career as a Radio Jockey at the age of 16.

Interviewer: Why did you choose Journalism & Media as your field of study?

Samiksha Koirala: I was determined to be a journalist from a young age. I was already working as a journalist and had received some practical training before starting my formal education in Journalism and Media. At that time, I thought studying journalism would help me grow as a responsible journalist.

Interviewer: Tell us more about your experience as a radio jockey.

Samiksha Koirala: I was just 16 when I started as a radio jockey and worked on the same radio station for over five years. When I joined radio in the early 2000s, FM radio stations saw a rapid upsurge in popularity. In a very short span, I received a lot of attention which was hard to handle for a teenager. My job connected me with opportunities like working as a voice-over artist and emceeing, which I thoroughly enjoyed. I slowly switched my radio jockey's role to a newsreader and then to a talk-show host. I thought those roles were taken more seriously then. There were very few women journalists in my city at that time. It was a challenging job as I was expected to work late-night too. I also faced harassment, and there was no clear policy against workplace harassment. On the positive side, I am grateful for my journey as I understood many practical aspects of journalism. It helped me understand my community better. More importantly, it boosted my confidence, and I was determined to remain in this field.

Interviewer: What was the topic of your doctoral dissertation? Tell us more about how you carried out the study.

Samiksha Koirala: My doctoral dissertation was titled "Gender representations in the Nepali press during pre-conflict, conflict and post-conflict periods." I was also curious about the relationship between gender and media. I strongly believe that the media is an important agent in addressing gender-based discrimination and inequalities. Access to information empowers women, gender/sexual minorities, and people of marginal communities.

My study investigates gender representations in Nepali mainstream daily newspapers to discover whether the ten-year-long armed conflict of 1996 to 2006 has impacted the way men and women are represented in the press. It interrogates the content of three mainstream daily newspapers in three time periods (pre-, during, and post-conflict) across a period of 20 years (1994–2014). Methodologically, I adopted mixed methods research and was guided by feminist media studies. The Maoist insurgency in Nepal is one of the most significant armed conflicts in the South Asian region. While 'horizontal inequality' with both ethnic and caste dimensions is considered the major reason for the armed conflict, gender inequality in Nepali society was also one of the contributing factors. This decade-long armed conflict in Nepal provided an opportunity for women to take on new roles and responsibilities. Therefore, in my thesis, I focused on whether there has been an increment and improvement in the nature of representation in the newspapers on the gender realm in post-conflict Nepal.

Interviewer: You have quite a bit of international experience. Can you describe what got you interested in studying and working in other countries?

Samiksha Koirala: I think it's mainly two things: I love challenges and always want to learn and experience a new culture. I firmly believe that when you study and work abroad, you learn every other moment. It takes courage to leave your home country, pack up your belongings in a suitcase or two, and head to a country you might have never been to. My experience has definitely broadened my worldview, and I think it has helped me to be a better version of myself.

Interviewer: What attracted you to come to Bangladesh? What is your impression so far?

Samiksha Koirala: I completed my Master's degree from Dhaka University. I am back here after more than ten years. In the last ten years, many things have changed here, particularly in infrastructural development. There are many socio-cultural similarities between Nepal and Bangladesh. People are incredibly friendly and helpful. I consider Bangladesh my second home, and it's incredible to be back.

Interviewer: You mention that you have experience working with the United Nations. Can you elaborate?

Samiksha Koirala: I have worked with various UN agencies as a Research Consultant. I've closely worked with organizations like UNFPA, UNDP, UN Women, and UNESCO in Nepal and other countries. The best part of working with the United Nations is you get a multicultural work environment. It's always fascinating to see how the UN works at the intersection of the government and civil society organizations. My main contributions have been in the area of training journalists, developing training manuals and handbooks, and also in conducting studies in the area of gender, journalism, and safety of journalists.

Interviewer: What inspired you to begin your career in journalism?

Samiksha Koirala: I have always wanted my career to directly contribute to society and address the issue of marginal communities. With the help of journalism, I wanted to be the "voice of the voiceless. "I used to read different news-based magazines and newspapers from a young age. My exposure to news stories at a young age must have inspired me. I don't think it was about a particular incident or a person. The career somehow aligned perfectly with my dream of changing society for good. My school was located just opposite one of the local FM radio stations. I always dreamt of working there as a student and ended up working there too.

Interviewer: What made you focus on digital harassment?

Samiksha Koirala: During my Ph.D. in Norway, I got an opportunity to participate in different events around this topic. This issue needs serious attention as it gets often ignored in developing countries. Digital harassment has a silencing effect, and it's not always easy to understand the situation or to conduct research. As someone who was always interested in the relationship between gender and media, I am closely following the issues around gender-based online harassment. While digital harassment affects all genders and people in different occupations, women journalists, activists, women politicians, and people from the LGBGTQ+ community are disproportionately targeted by hate speech online.

Interviewer: Tell us more about your experience working with the national daily Republica in Kathmandu. What kind of articles did you write? Are you still writing for any form of print journalism?

Samiksha Koirala: I worked as a full-time journalist in Republica for three and half years in the business bureau. I covered issues in Information Technology, Aviation, Tourism, and Banking. I did some investigative stories during my career questioning irregularities in these sectors. I also got an opportunity to travel to different countries and to meet and interview political leaders, diplomats, and entrepreneurs in Nepal and abroad. I write opinion articles occasionally, but I think I should do it more often.

Interviewer: Why has the safety of journalists become a concern globally?

Samiksha Koirala: Journalists worldwide are attacked and harassed for simply doing their job. It's essential to prioritize journalists' safety so they can work without fear. The security of journalists is a fundamental precondition for freedom of expression and press freedom. It is also directly related to strengthening peace and democracy. In the last few years, several journalists have been murdered because of their reporting, and many hundreds of violent assaults have taken place. It has been a global concern as impunity has gradually been allowed regarding these killings and serious assaults against journalists.

Interviewer: What kind of research do you hope to do while you are at North South University?

Samiksha Koirala: I will continue researching my area of interest. I am also considering doing comparative studies between Bangladesh and Nepal on gender and media.

Interviewer: Describe your teaching philosophy.

Samiksha Koirala: My past work experience has made me aware that each individual is unique. Therefore, I try to create an atmosphere where students from different backgrounds can meet their full potential. I always incorporate multiple learning modalities so students can learn through their preferred learning styles. For me, the ideal classroom environment can be created only when we keep students at the center. I encourage group projects and interactions where I work as a facilitator. Besides that, I also encourage students to share their experiences and think about different concepts and theories from the local context.

Nibras Yaman is a graduate of the Department of Business Administration of North South University, majoring in Finance and Economics. She graduated in 2009 as Summa Cum Laude. After completing her bachelor's, she pursued her Masters in Financial Economics from the City University of London, School of Social Sciences in the United Kingdom. She graduated in 2010 with Distinction. After completing her Masters, she returned to Bangladesh and joined Citibank N.A. as Management Associate under their Graduate Program. She has worked in the Banking Industry for over 12 years and has gained experience in both corporate and commercial banking. She is specialized in Anti Money Laundering (AML) Compliance and is passionate about pursuing her career further in this field. She works at Citibank N.A. in Canada as Vice President of AML Compliance. She often mentors young skilled immigrants and is driven to help newcomers navigate their job search journey in Canada. Apart from her daytime job as a Banker, she is a proud mother of two young boys. She loves hiking, traveling, and trying new experiences with her family.

Interviewer: What are some challenges of your work as an Anti-Money Laundering specialist?

Nibras Yaman: AML is a control function within the corporate banking sector. It requires professionals working

in this field to detect patterns and mechanisms by which a bank's client can use the bank's network to funnel illicit funds. The main challenges involve keeping oneself appraised of the evolving methods by which individuals and entities launder money. Emerging challenges come from the rapidly evolving digital currency world. Virtual currency exchanges, online gambling platforms, payment intermediaries, or money service businesses pose greater threats in correctly tracing money movements, thereby increasing money laundering risks for any financial institution.

Interviewer: Are you involved in mentoring young skilled immigrants? What motivated you to start this? What are your plans regarding this mentorship?

Nibras Yaman: Skilled immigrants often find it difficult to start their careers in the western world. While individuals may have had a successful career in their home country, some find it difficult to merge into a developed country's financial industry workforce. This is mainly due to a lack of knowledge of the hiring process as well as a lack of networking skills. As a skilled immigrant, I could help newcomers by sharing my knowledge. I mentor pro-bono at various voluntary organizations, but time management is challenging. I wish to continue this work and hope I can manage to get more time out from my busy schedule and help out as many skilled women newcomers as I can who are looking to find work in the financial sector.

Interviewer: What motivates you? What is your source of inspiration?

Nibras Yaman: My motivation for everything I do comes from my parents. My father has always nurtured my sister and me to be financially independent and always gave me the confidence to pursue everything I ever wished to pursue. He is a prominent banker in Bangladesh and has always inspired me to become one.

I strongly believe in women's empowerment and will always take on the opportunity to challenge myself. My husband and my children are very accommodating and encouraging in everything I wish to pursue. They inspire me to be better every day.

Interviewer: How much impact do you think NSU has had in your career and life later?

Nibras Yaman: I believe NSU's graduate programs provide building blocks for any self-conscious young adult committed to their education. I have had outstanding lecturers during my bachelor's at NSU; my passion for economics and finance came from my teachers. The standardized curriculum is world recognized. It definitely provided me with a strong stepping stone towards my future Master's degree in the U.K. NSU has given me amazing lifelong friends.

Interviewer: What is your advice for current students of NSU?

Nibras Yaman: Be sincere with your studies. There are many distractions; however, the time spent in NSU can make a difference in your future. Identify the subjects that stimulate your learning and focus your education around those. Make respectful connections not only with your friends but with your seniors and your teachers, and those will go a long way.

Interviewer: Is there anything inspiring from your life that you would like to share with us?

Hassan: In my life, many people inspired me to achieve success, my parents sacrificed a lot, but hiding their pain, they never gave up and always motivated me with my work; they are working hard only for me to live a better and happy life. My teachers are my second parents; they gave me knowledge treating us like their own children. My sibling always helps me in every situation whenever I have difficulties. My friends always share their things with me. They always remind us whenever I am happy.

Interviewer: Do you have any suggestions for the future applicants of NSU?

Hassan: I recommend NSU to all, especially international students. NSU is the first University in Bangladesh that provides quality education. NSU is open to all nations and ready to accept international students regardless of race, culture, or religion. After that, as an international student, if you are looking for the best quality education, NSU is here for you to become the best version of yourself.
