### **NSU Alumni Talk Show 122**

In July 06, 2023, the NSU Alumni Talk Show aired the one-hundred-and-twenty-second episode featuring the accomplished Ms. Mansurin Khan Choudhury from the 1994 batch. Ms. Choudhury completed her Bachelor of Science in Computer Science and Engineering. She pursued a Master of Business Administration (MBA) at Monash University, Australia, where she earned the prestigious Australian Commonwealth Scholarship in 2014. In 2006, she joined the Bangladesh Civil Service as the Deputy Chief Accounts Officer in the Department of Audit and Accounts, Government of Bangladesh, and held various significant positions throughout her career, including serving as a Counselor in the Consulate General of Bangladesh in Toronto. Notably, she is the first to join the Bangladesh Civil Service from NSU and an O'Levels curriculum. Presently, Ms. Choudhury holds the esteemed position of Chief Accounts and Finance Officer in the Economic Relations Division, Ministry of Finance, under the Government of Bangladesh.



Ms. Mansurin Khan Choudhury was asked about her current role and journey during the interview. She shared that her father was a significant inspiration for her, particularly in pursuing a career in the civil service. With a family history of civil service, she took it as a challenge and successfully passed the BCS exam, entering the audit and accounts department as her first choice. Throughout her career, she worked at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Ms. Choudhury served in various positions at the Consulate General of Bangladesh in Toronto, Canada, eventually joining the foreign service on deputation. These experiences provided her with valuable opportunities, exposure, and learning. Currently, she holds the esteemed position of Chief Accounts and Finance Officer in the Economic Relations Division (ERD) of the Ministry of Finance. In this role, she serves as a financial advisor, overseeing budget management and authorizing disbursements from organizations such as the World Bank, IMF, and ADB. She also manages payrolls, pensions, and General Provident Fund (GPF) allocations.

During her tenure as a diplomat in Canada, Ms. Choudhury served as the First Secretary and Head of Chancery, working closely with the Consul General. Her responsibilities extended beyond governmental affairs to assisting the community, including diaspora members, with visa, passport, and international student-related matters. Notably, during the challenging times of the COVID-19 pandemic, she played a pivotal role in arranging a chartered flight to Bangladesh for stranded international students, ensuring their safe return. Her dedication and commitment to helping others made this experience a significant highlight of her time in Canada, which she found immensely fulfilling.

Transitioning from an O-level curriculum to joining civil services posed challenges for Ms. Mansurin Khan Choudhury, particularly in navigating the preliminary exams conducted in Bangla. Despite enrolling in coaching centers, she faced difficulty understanding the terms and concepts presented. However, her determination and resourcefulness led her to devise a unique study method using a whiteboard to write down and memorize Bangla terms and grammar. This diligent preparation allowed her to pass the exams successfully. Furthermore, the subsequent written exam, which offered Bangla or English questions, proved more manageable, enabling her to perform well. Her perseverance and adaptability in overcoming language barriers serve as an inspiration to others.

Ms. Choudhury highlights essential skills and characteristics for diplomats, emphasizing the significance of articulation, good negotiation skills acquired through experience and guidance, and proficient writing abilities crucial for civil service roles. When asked about women's leadership in civil services, she observes significant progress, citing examples of women holding prominent positions, such as the finance secretary and ERD secretary, indicating the government's commitment to empowering more women. However, Ms. Choudhury emphasizes the need for increased representation of women in the civil service. Offering advice to private university students aspiring to join civil services, she asserts that the key is an assertive determination from the outset, emphasizing that private university students can thrive in this competitive field by combining knowledge with a deep understanding of the BCS system. Ms. Choudhury's journey is an inspiration, show-casing the importance of ambition and resilience in pursuing a fulfilling career in civil services.

Ms. Mansurin Khan Choudhury reveals that her reason for choosing NSU stemmed from her desire to study at an American university, inspired by her readings of Archie comics and Enid Blyton books. However, upon joining NSU, she instantly fell in love with the campus environment, supportive faculty, and close-knit community. She cherishes the friendships she made at NSU and remains in touch with them, as they provide a sense of familiarity and connection. NSU profoundly impacted her higher studies abroad, instilling confidence and providing a network of support. In her advice to current NSU students, she encourages them to hold their heads high, emphasizing that being from a private university does not diminish their capabilities. She highlights NSU's preparation for the job market and reminds students of their potential for success with confidence and motivation. Ms. Choudhury's journey exemplifies the transformative power of NSU's nurturing environment and inspires current students embarking on their paths.

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

### Collaboration Meeting with Western Sydney University, Australia

In a virtual meeting held on July 6, 2023, via Zoom, North South University (NSU) and Western Sydney University (WSU) continued their collaborative journey. This follow-up gathering stemmed from the recent visit of NSU's Vice-Chancellor, Professor Atiqul Islam, to WSU, culminating in the renewal of their Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) to strengthen their partnership.



Distinguished attendees from NSU included Professor Helal Ahammad, Dean of the School of Business and Economics; Dr. Katherine Li, Director of External Affairs; and Dr. Hasanuzzaman, Assistant Director of External Affairs. Western Sydney University was represented by Professor Amir Mahmood, Dean of the School of



Western Sydney University was represented by Professor Amir Mahmood, Dean of the School of Business; Professor Stella Huiying Wu, Associate Dean of International; and Dr. Mamta Chowdhury, International Academic Lead for Bangladesh. The focus of the meeting revolved around collaborative initiatives, including research collaborations, organizing research symposia, conducting specific workshops, faculty and staff capacity building, scholarship opportunities for NSU faculty, and curriculum alignment between the two institutions. A notable development was the generous scholarship offer in the field of accounting extended by WSU's Vice-Chancellor, Professor Barney Glover AO, to a faculty member from NSU, fostering research and profession-al growth.

Additionally, the Indo-Pacific Consortium, aimed at promoting academic and research partnerships among regional universities, was highlighted as a valuable platform for collaboration. The meeting concluded with a shared commitment to productive cooperation and optimistic anticipation of the positive outcomes of this strengthened partnership between NSU and WSU. This collaboration promises to be a significant stride in the advancement of education and research in the Indo-Pacific region.

# What's Your Story? (Episode 17)

The seventeenth episode of What's Your Story was aired on Facebook Live, on July 12, 2023. The spotlight was shone on Dr. MD. Sahadat Hossain, Ph.D., P.E., a distinguished professional in geotechnical and geoenvironmental engineering. Currently serving as the Director of the Solid Waste Institute for Sustainability (SW9S) and a Professor in the Department of Civil Engineering at The University of Texas at Arlington, USA, Dr. Hossain is renowned for his extensive contributions to sustainable waste management.

SWIS, under Dr. Hossain's leadership, is dedicated to fostering clean and healthy cities through sustainable waste management practices. Dr. Hossain's commitment to this mission is exemplified by initiating the sustainable waste management and landfill training program, ISWS, since 2016. With over 25 years of research and professional experience, he



has been involved in more than 150 geotechnical design and construction projects spanning countries such as Bangladesh, Singapore, Malaysia, Thailand, Hong Kong, and the United States. Dr. Hossain's expertise extends to innovative solutions, notably in recycling plastic bins for slope stabilization, a subject on which various news channels have interviewed him and for which he even authored a book. His pioneering work also includes the development of plastic roads, utilizing recycled plastics as a substitute for conventional asphalt pavement roads. As a recognized landfill expert, he has conducted investigations of recent dumpsite failures in Odis Aba, Ethiopia. His invitations underscore Dr. Hossain's global influence as a keynote speaker and technical expert in numerous countries, including Ethiopia, Tanzania, Brazil, Nigeria, Belgium, Serbia, India, Bangladesh, and Thailand.

Beyond his extensive contributions to the field, Dr. Hossain is a prolific author of four books, over 200 journal publications, and more than 100 technical reports to his name. His dedication to education is evidenced by his supervision of 36 Ph.D. and 45 M.S. students and his current mentorship of 9 Ph.D. and 12 M.S. students. Dr. Hossain's academic journey began with a Bachelor of Science degree in civil engineering from IIT Bombay in 1994, followed by a Master's degree in 1997 at AIT, where he earned a prestigious scholarship among 150 students. He completed his Ph.D. at North Carolina State University in 2002, solidifying his status as a respected authority in the field of sustainable waste management and geotechnical engineering.

Dr. Hossain, hailing from Vikrampur, faced early life challenges as his father passed away when he was merely three years old. Raised by his single mother, he drew strength and guidance from his sisters, who played a pivotal role in shaping his life. His enduring motivation to study civil engineering was deeply rooted in his childhood desire to build a bridge, significantly reducing the arduous six-hour journey to his village. Financial constraints initially hindered his dream of pursuing education in the United States. However, his unwavering commitment led him to decline a Ph.D. offer at the University of Cambridge in favor of realizing his lifelong dream. Before embarking on his journey to the U.S., he gained valuable experience in Singapore while dedicating himself to preparing for the GRE and U.S. university applications from the moment he arrived. Despite receiving numerous offers from top U.S. institutions, Dr. Hossain chose North Carolina due to the allure of full funding. Reflecting on his early inspiration, he recalled reading a newspaper article about Ronald Reagan, a movie star turned U.S. president, which ignited his fascination with the United States. From a young age, he recognized America as a land of boundless opportunities, a belief that continues to drive his unwavering pursuit of his dreams.

Two profound motivations propelled Dr. Hossain's journey into solid waste management. Firstly, this field offered abundant funding and opportunities, which kindled his interest. Secondly, a heartfelt concern for the health of his childhood friends, who lived near an open dumpsite in Bangladesh and frequently fell ill, ignited his passion to uncover the reasons behind their vulnerability.


His aspiration to become a professor in the United States encountered initial setbacks, as all five universities he applied to post-PhD declined his applications. Undeterred, he embarked on a mission to bolster his academic profile. Driven by an unquenchable thirst for knowledge, he engaged in waste management projects across different cities. During this time, the call from UT Arlington, which would alter the course of his career, came.

Recognizing the recurring challenges various cities face, a friend's advice prompted him to establish an organized research centre of excellence (ORC). However, meeting the university's stringent requirements, including securing a \$1 million grant for three consecutive years, was no small feat. His relentless dedication culminated in the approval of the centre in 2015. Dr. Hossain's commitment to networking saw him venture to international conferences, where serendipity led to his fortuitous meeting with David Bitterman, the President of the International Solid Waste Association (ISWA). Their connection was instant; together, they embarked on a four-year journey, attending conferences and meeting country leaders, laying the foundation for the international program. This remarkable odyssey demonstrates the profound impact of relentless determination and hard work. Dr. Hossain's journey is a testament to the fact that dedication and unwavering perseverance pave the path to success, making him an inspiration to students and aspiring academics alike.

### **Coordination Meeting with the Special Branch Police**

On July 23, 2023, a meeting took place in Malibagh Special Branch of Police involving officers from the Special Branch, the Assistant Superintendent of Police and the Superintendent Police from the Security Control Office (SCO). This gathering convened with representatives from 23 public and private universities to address the legal intricacies associated with international students coming to study in Bangladesh. From North South University (NSU) Ms. Samina Alam Miti, International Affairs Officer,



The primary agenda of this gathering was to address the legal complexities surrounding international students' enrollment in Bangladeshi universities. During the meeting, it was emphasized that universities must diligently verify the solvency of overseas students and

maintain a record of those who may transfer abroad, graduate or discontinue their studies. It was stressed that students must complete their studies and return to their home countries, as certain institutions have encountered difficulties in repatriating students, leading to various legal issues.

In a significant development, plans are underway to create software automation linking the Special Branch office and universities to monitor the students closely. Strict adherence to regulations was emphasized, emphasizing that students must possess a valid study permit, particularly when on a business visa. Those already employed are only permitted to attend evening classes. Ensuring the accuracy and regular updating of students' residential addresses to the universities and the Special Branch was also highlighted as a critical measure. NSU was commended for its exceptional cooperation, serving as a positive example in promptly resolving any issues contributing to its well-regarded status.

At UDEM, NSU's undergraduate scholars gain access to an extensive selection of English-language academic disciplines, spanning Business Administration, Accounting, Economics, Law, Social Sciences, Engineering, Modern Languages, Humanities, Architecture, and Design. In this enriching environment, they can learn from distinguished professors, engage with a diverse community of students, and foster cross-cultural understanding. This collaboration with UDEM is poised to enhance NSU students' global outlook, language proficiency, and cultural competency, which are paramount in our interconnected world.

This agreement's core objectives are twofold: first, to establish concrete educational

relations and cooperation between the participating institutions, facilitating academic linkages and promoting cultural understanding between the two nations. Secondly, the agreement paves the way for collaboration in several areas, including student and faculty exchanges, collaborative research endeavors, scientific events, conferences, seminars, and the exchange of bibliographic materials. It's essential to note that this agreement does not entail any financial commitment at this stage, and the financial aspects of specific programs or projects will be determined separately as both institutions explore external funding avenues for the activities outlined in this agreement.

Following ethical clearance, the rigorous data collection process began, culminating in her thesis defense. Remarkably, she accomplished her Ph.D. within just 3.5 years, a





testament to her dedication and efficient approach. Dr. Sultana offers valuable advice for aspiring researchers: selecting a subject of genuine interest, opting for a university with substantial research grants, refining communication skills, mastering referencing techniques, and ensuring the research's precision, authenticity, and originality.

Reflecting on her undergraduate years, Dr. Faria Sultana fondly remembers residing near the old campus, a convenience that allowed her to return home promptly after classes. Her abode became a hub of camaraderie as friends often gathered there. The economics department, characterized by a tight-knit atmosphere, profoundly impacted her. # JLIFAD Investing in rural people

The introductory meeting between the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) and North South University's Office of External Affairs (OEA) was held through Zoom on August 07, 2023. The virtual gathering aimed to explore potential collaboration avenues. Present were Dr. Katherine Li, Director of OEA; Mr. Nabil Rahaman, Country Programme Analyst of IFAD's Asia and the Pacific Division; and Mr. Mehedi Masud Sumon, Officer of OEA.

Dr. Katherine Li chaired the session, commencing with an overview of OEA's role in advancing research activities at NSU. Emphasis was placed on research collaboration, joint publications, training, and internship opportunities. Dr. Li highlighted NSU's ongoing research focus and potential for partnering on impactful projects.

Mr. Nabil Rahaman introduced IFAD as an international financial institution established in 1977 under the United Nations General Assembly. Headquartered in Rome, Italy, IFAD is dedicated to eradicating rural poverty and hunger. It specializes in providing grants and loans with low interest to projects to enhance agricultural development, livelihoods, disaster preparedness, technology transfer, and climate resilience. IFAD's notable achievements include impacting over 400 million people across nearly 100 countries since its inception.



In Bangladesh, IFAD has been investing in rural communities since 1978. The organization promotes inclusive livelihood opportunities for smallholders, micro-entrepreneurs, and marginalized groups, strongly focusing on climate change adaptation, resilient infrastructure, market access, and diversified economies. Key thematic areas encompass women's empowerment, youth engagement, nutrition improvement, and sustainable resource management. Mr. Rahaman detailed IFAD's ongoing projects, highlighting initiatives such as the Char Development and Settlement Project (CDSP) IV Additional Financing, Haor Infrastructure & Livelihood Improvement Project–Climate Adaptation & Livelihood Protection (HILIP-CALIP), and more. He underlined the alignment of IFAD's interventions with the Sustainable Development Goals, including no poverty, zero hunger, quality education, decent work and economic growth, industry and innovation, climate action, and strong institutions.

At the meeting, discussions revolved around potential academic collaborations, particularly in women's empowerment and development-focused areas. He carries the esteemed role of International Director within the College of Health at Massey University's School of Sport, Exercise, and Nutrition.

Dr. Ali's remarkable journey includes his pivotal role in establishing a cutting-edge sport and exercise science laboratory in Auckland. His academic leadership extends to supervising a substantial cohort of over 20 master's and Ph.D. students, a testament to his dedication to nurturing the next generation of scholars. His diverse research portfolio encompasses pediatric exercise science,

nutritional supplementation for health, wellness, performance enhancement, sports performance optimization, and workplace wellness. Additionally, he has made significant contributions as a former Deputy Chair of Massey University's Human Ethics Department. Notably, Dr. Ali holds the esteemed position of Principal Researcher for the Healthy Learning initiative, a vital component of the government's well-being budget allocation of 47 million dollars, aimed at enhancing children's overall health and wellness through initiatives related to nutrition, hydration, and physical activity. Furthermore, his impactful leadership extends to his directorship of the Center for Metabolic Health Research, a pioneering initiative dedicated to interdisciplinary research in metabolic health. Additionally, he oversees the Beverage Lab, showcasing his multifaceted involvement in various facets of scientific exploration.

Dr. Ali's journey from his birthplace in Sylhet to the United Kingdom at the tender age of five adds a poignant layer to his narrative. Growing up as the only child of color in his school in Royston, he defied societal expectations and parental skepticism to pursue his education diligently, even resorting to forging his father's signature to attend school. Today, he is a source of immense pride for his family, illustrating the transformative power of determination and education. Dr. Ali's journey is a source of inspiration, demonstrating the profound impact of perseverance and dedication on one's trajectory toward excellence. His accomplishments reflect his personal success and his unwavering commitment to the betterment of society through his significant contributions to research, education, and public health initiatives.

Dr. Ali's journey toward becoming a prominent figure in academia and research is rooted in his early passion for sports and physical education and an unexpected opportunity that set his course. Initially aspiring to become a Physical Education (PE) teacher due to his love for sports and physical activities, Dr. Ali had a fateful encounter with a gentleman who invited him to participate in a study. This initial involvement in research kindled a new path for him, and he soon found himself transitioning from an aspiring PE teacher to a burgeoning researcher. This transformation led him through the rigors of master's and doctoral studies, marking the inception of his remarkable academic journey.

Masud Hassan, the Deputy Executive Director of VERC, was the keynote speaker for this episode. VERC is dedicated to grassroots education and community development and is pivotal in advancing education and empowering communities in various regions. Led by Mr. Hassan's insights, this episode promises to shed light on VERC's impactful initiatives and its commitment to fostering positive change at the grassroots level.

VERC, or the Village Education Resource Center, embarked on its journey in 1977 as a project under SCF-USA. Its primary goal was to provide process consultancy to internal projects of SCF-USA, ensuring active community participation in project implementation. Over the years, VERC transitioned into an independent local organization, extending its role beyond SCF-USA to serve the broader NGO sector in Bangladesh. Throughout its history, VERC's approach and responsibilities have evolved significantly. It initially focused on offering high-level technical consultancy with minimal implementation involvement, later shifting towards extensive project implementation and reduced technical support. VERC primarily concentrates on implementing diverse development projects while providing limited technical assistance to other NGOs. VERC has gained recognition for its pioneering contributions to Non-Formal Education (NFE) and Community-Led Total Sanitation (CLTS) programs.

Aligned with the concept of a learning organization, as articulated by Peter Senge, VERC continuously refines its strategies through strategic planning. The Participatory Strategic Plan for 2015-2020 underscores VERC's commitment to charting its developmental path meticulously. VERC envisions a self-reliant, enlightened society founded on principles of justice, equity, and sustainability. Their mission revolves around transforming the lives of marginalized and disadvantaged individuals, providing humanitarian assistance, fostering resilient livelihoods, and creating an enabling environment for self-empowerment. VERC upholds core values such as participation, respect, environmental responsibility, sustainability, innovation, good governance, and equality to achieve these aims.

Interviewer: You currently work as an Assistant Registrar at North South University. How does it feel to be able to serve your university and be actively involved in its development?

#### Interviewer: Who is/are your role model/s? What are the things that inspire you in life?

#### Interviewer: How much impact do you think NSU had in your career and life?

# **International Student Feature**

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Sangey Gyamtsho comes from the beautiful country of Bhutan. He is 18 and has a younger sister studying in the ninth grade. His father serves as an army officer, holding the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in the Royal Bhutan Army, while his mother works as a Finance Counselor at the Royal Bhutanese Embassy in Dhaka, Bangladesh.

His educational journey began with pre-primary education at a private Early Childhood Care and Development (ECCD) center. He started



my primary education at Sunshine Primary School in the capital city, Thimphu. In 2013, he moved to Western Australia with his family, where he attended Millen Primary School for my third and fourth grades. Upon returning to Bhutan at the end of 2014, he continued my studies at Sunshine Primary School until sixth grade. He then attended Lungtenzampa Middle Secondary School and Yangchenhug Higher Secondary School, where he completed my twelfth grade.

During his school years, Sangey actively engaged in roles such as class monitor, event coordinator, and social worker. Apart from his studies, during his weekends, he assisted his grandparents in their real estate business. Tasks ranging from plumbing and electrical work to carpentry, painting, and house vacating repairs became their shared responsibilities. Given the scarcity of laborers in Bhutan, his family and he often undertook these tasks themselves. He also had the honor of participating in the National Youth Engagement and Health Literacy Meet, organized by WHO. Coming from a military background, he enjoys sports like basketball and swimming. He also has a keen interest in driving cars and cycling. Looking ahead, his goals are clear. Sangey plans to pursue a Business Administration (BBA) degree with a Finance major. He aims to complete his studies with good grades and within the set timeframe. He also has a keen interest in studying and exploring potential business opportunities between Bhutan and Bangladesh and seeking avenues for future ventures.

#### Interviewer: Can you tell us more about growing up in Bhutan and Western Australia?

Sangey: I spent most of my childhood in Bhutan, but I also had a brief experience living in Australia. Growing up in both countries has given me unique experiences shaped by culture, society, and the environment. In Bhutan, we learn about the value of community, education, culture, and the environment from a young age. This means that growing up involves having strong connections with our extended family and community. I was taught Buddhist values early on and participated in various religious ceremonies and rituals. While education is primarily accessible in Bhutan, with only a few private schools charging fees, the focus on academics is intense. Getting good grades is the primary way to progress to higher classes. On the other hand, the education system in Australia is more comprehensive, aiming to develop children in all areas. The best part was that there were no exams. Life in Bhutan is simpler; we can walk to school and back home without close monitoring. Parents could send us to school from home, and teachers could teach and send us back home. In Australia, things were different. We relied heavily on technology for education, communication, and entertainment. Unlike in Bhutan, we couldn't go to school on our own. Our parents had to drop us off and pick us up. Since I enjoy outdoor activities, Bhutan's pristine natural environment has been essential to my upbringing. I used to spend time outdoors, going for walks, cycling, and hiking. In Australia, my outdoor activities were mainly limited to outings to the beach.

#### Interviewer: Could you share some insight into the differences between the education systems in Australia, Bhutan, and Bangladesh?

Sangey: In general education systems in Australia and Bhutan differ in curriculum emphasis, cultural influence, and educational structures. Bhutan's education system integrates academics, traditional values, and holistic wellbeing. Parents and community members play an active role in supporting schools and education. Australia's education system focuses on a broad education with academic subjects, creative arts, and physical education. Specifically, I would like to express the difference in the education system for primary schools, which I have personally experienced.

i. Roles and responsibilities of teachers: In Bhutan, the teacher's role starts and finishes in schools. The teaching is one-way communication with the exceptions where students can ask questions and clarify their doubts. In Australia, although I was still a kid when I studied there, I felt that teaching is a two-way communication where teachers interact with you, ask your opinions, and give you respect as they do to an adult. The teacher guides and monitors you like a mentor, and you can speak out whatever you feel.

ii. <u>Parental consent</u>: In Bhutan, verbal consent is taken for any activities out of school like field trips or school picnics/ events involving the move of students out of school and any financial contribution. Still, most of the time it comes as a compulsory programme. (But now things are changing.) In Australia, for any activities out of school, like field trips or school picnics/ events involving the move of students out of school and any financial contribution, written parental consent must be submitted; otherwise, the activities are barred for the student. (A right given to individuals whether to participate or not)

iii. Sitting arrangement: Although it differs from school to school, in Bhutan, the sitting arrangement is two people at a desk facing the blackboard and teacher, while in Australia, I remember being seated at a circular table with four to five kids.

#### Interviewer: Could you elaborate on your roles when assisting your grandparents in their real estate business? How did it impact your skills? **Sangey:** Roles that I have taken to assist my grandparents:

- Driver: I drive the vehicle to carry repair and maintenance materials and equipment within the estate compound.
- Assistant plumber: I go with my father, uncles, and grandfather to repair and maintain plumbing while laying and connecting new pipelines.
- Assistant electrician: I go with my father, uncles, and grandfather to work on electrical repair and maintenance and connect new lines.

Painter: I go with my family members to do painting jobs like repainting walls with distemper paints and oil paints for windows and doors. This is usually done whenever an apartment is vacated and before new tenants move in as a new tenant.

#### Impact on my skills:

Knowledge of tools, equipment, and materials: I became familiar with many tools, equipment, and materials used for repair and maintenance

- <u>Budgeting</u>: I know the cost of tools, material for plumbing, electrical, and painting items, and how much would be required to carry out the works.
- Driving skills: Apart from knowing how to drive, I have also learned how to carry out minor repairs and maintenance of vehicles.

#### Interviewer: How has your family's willingness to undertake labor-intensive tasks impacted your work ethic and sense of responsibility?

Sangey: Since Bhutan is a small country with a significantly smaller population, we import labor on work permits for specific works like house construction and project work. Therefore, the minor maintenance and repair work must be done by ourselves. We are a middle-class, hard-working family, and we take pride in doing any type of work at home. Doing such jobs has made me more mature and responsible, which I have demonstrated at school by being the class captain from grade six to eleven. As a class captain, I had to lead my class in various activities and competitions where, most of the time, my class won, but of course, with our class teacher's guidance and my classmates' support.

#### Interviewer: How has your involvement in social work impacted your community and personal development?

Sangey: My involvement in social work has brought about positive change in the community by promoting wellbeing. On a personal level, doing social work has given me peace and a deep sense of fulfillment, bringing many changes to my character. It has fostered empathy, compassion, resilience, and problem-solving skills in me.

Interviewer: Can you discuss your participation in the National Youth Engagement and Health Literacy Meet organized by WHO? What motivated you to participate, and what did you learn from your participation?

**Sangey:** The national youth engagement and health literacy program was at the Youth Development Fund or YDF compound for two days. I was honored to meet His Excellency, the prime minister of my country, along with the Health Minister and other members of parliaments and people from the World Health Organization. On the first day, there were lectures from the chief guest about various health issues in the country and how we should try to spread awareness to others. On the second day, we were divided into groups for discussions on tackling various diseases in the country; after that, we had to represent the art of acting. In the last part of the program, we were shown the leadership roles and responsibilities and the importance of having a great leader.

I participated in the program as a representative of my class as I was the class captain. I learned from the two-day program the global health issues and health issues specific to my country, Awareness of WHO's initiatives and advocacy, leadership skills, youth engagement techniques, etc.

#### Interviewer: What draws you to the fields of business administration and Finance, and how do you see them fitting into your future aspirations?

**Sangey:** I'm interested in Business administration and Finance as it has many career opportunities that align with my interest and strength. Additionally, I foresee the potential to contribute to my grandparent's real estate business management in the future, should the need arise. Although my immediate career goal is to gain experience by working under someone's mentorship, my ultimate aspiration is to establish my venture. Since Business

administration and Finance are closely linked to entrepreneurship and starting new ventures, a strong foundation would be invaluable. This foundation would facilitate my professional growth and provide the knowledge and skills necessary to navigate the challenges of entrepreneurship successfully.

#### Interviewer: Could you share any insights into your aspirations to start your ventures in the future potentially?

**Sangey:** I am not entirely sure about my venture, as Bhutan is a developing country with business opportunities that often require a trial-and-error approach. Nevertheless, I am considering following my grandfather's path in real estate development. The dynamic nature of this field, coupled with the market's evolving needs, makes it an exciting avenue to explore. While uncertainties and challenges will be there, by leveraging the foundational knowledge I will gain in Business administration and Finance, I can overcome the complexities of real estate development and contribute to the growth of this sector in Bhutan.

#### Interviewer: How do you plan to bridge potential business opportunities between Bhutan and Bangladesh during your studies?

**Sangey:** During my studies here, I intend to conduct market research to identify sectors with growth potential in both countries, establish networking connections, attend business conferences and trade events if I get the opportunity, and familiarize myself with the regulations and market trends of both countries.

Interviewer: What advice would you give to young individuals seeking to balance academic pursuits, personal interests, and community involvement based on your

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journey?

**Sangey:** My advice to young individuals would be:

- All tasks should be equally important, whether simple or complex.
- Strive to be a leader rather than following what others do.
- Take initiative and work hard consistently regardless of immediate reward. Your efforts will pay off over time.
- Support your parents and grandparents to do routine chores at home.
- Make an effort to care for and spend time with your siblings.
- Stay curious and seek opportunities to learn joyous and valuable things.
- Do not indulge in bad habits like drinking alcohol, using drugs, and smoking.
- Develop budgeting skills and be mindful of unnecessary spending to manage your finances effectively.

# **International Faculty Feature**



**Dr. Soumik Pal** works as Assistant Professor of Media, Communication and Journalism in the Department of Political Science and Sociology at North South University, Dhaka. He holds a Ph.D. in Film and Media Studies from Southern Illinois University, Carbondale. His work has been published in journals such as Studies in South Asian Film and Media, NORMA: International Journal for Masculinity Studies, and edited volumes on Bollywood cinema and language politics in India. He has worked on the phenomenon of stardom and celebrity as commodity, notions of masculinity as seen in Hindi cinema from the 1970s to the contemporary era, and how that has informed Indian politics leading up to the current Hindutva era. His research interests include neoliberal cultures concerning bureaucracy, finance, construction of gender representations, and the rise of fascism.

#### Interviewer: Please tell us about your educational journey from the beginning.

**Dr. Pal:** I grew up in an industrial township called Durgapur in West Bengal, India. I did my schooling in Durgapur from St. Xavier's School. Whereas the school standards were good in Durgapur, the town was obsessed with students pursuing STEM disciplines only. Braving consternation from acquaintances, I chose to study English for my undergrad (RK Mission Residential College, Narendrapur, affiliated to the

University of Calcutta), and then pursued Film Studies for my Master's degree from Jadavpur University, Kolkata. After that, I did an MBA in Communications Management from Mudra Institute of Communications, Ahmedabad (MICA) and worked for 3 years in the corporate sector before pursuing my PhD in the United States.

#### Interviewer: Who was your role model?

**Dr. Pal:** I have had many people who I found inspirational, from my parents to school teachers, from artists like Tagore to historical figures like Bhagat Singh. My role models kept changing with age and it would be difficult to choose one role model.

#### Interviewer: How did you discover your passion for the Media Arts?

**Dr. Pal:** Since childhood, I was interested in what we broadly call the "arts". I was always interested in reading literature, watching films, listening to music and I took these hobbies seriously, even as a kid. And during my college and university (Master's) years, the nascent liking took shape and I realized that I wanted to study arts, society and culture full-time.

#### Interviewer: What made you choose Southern Illinois University, Carbondale for your PhD? How was your experience?

**Dr. Pal:** I chose Southern Illinois University, Carbondale purely on the basis of my advisor, Dr. Jyotsna Kapur, whose research interests matched the most closely with mine. In retrospect, I can say that I made the right choice and I have been lucky to have her as my PhD guide.

My PhD experience was good and enjoyable overall. Carbondale is an idyllic university town that is close to nature and enjoys an incredible international student population. I loved small-town America, the facilities that the university provided, the local community and my graduate school colleagues' company. Like most others, my PhD journey was not easy by any means, as it dragged on a bit but looking back, I would call the experience a memorable one.

#### Interviewer: What was the difference between the educational systems in India and the US?

**Dr. Pal:** I think the main difference is regarding resources. While I studied in top schools and colleges in India, whose pedagogy and standards of academics are as good as any institution in the US, the main difference was in access to resources such as a good, well-staffed, easy-to-access library, or something as seemingly

basic as the availability of clean bathrooms on campus.

#### Interviewer: What made you want to make your career in academia?

**Dr. Pal:** I first thought of academia as my vocation while doing my MA in Film Studies at Jadavpur University. JU was my first encounter with serious academics and its concerns, and I found myself enjoying the process. Later on, as I taught my own courses at SIUC, I discovered the sense of joy, achievement and fulfillment that teaching gave me. So, since teaching and research are both processes that I enjoy, and I find fulfillment in critical thinking, I chose my career in academia.

#### Interviewer: Tell us about your research interests.

**Dr. Pal:** My primary research interest is South Asian popular culture, especially, as it relates to the changing socio-politics of the region. I am particularly interested in understanding cultures under neoliberalism and also, what social, cultural, economic and political processes contribute to the threat of fascism looming large over the region.

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#### Interviewer: Do you make films?

Dr. Pal: No, I am an academic on the studies track. Though I have tried my hand at short documentaries and do plan to get into filmmaking in future.

#### Interviewer: How would you compare the global film industries approach to filmmaking historically and contemporarily?

**Dr. Pal:** Worldwide, most major film industries have developed along capitalist lines of production, and so, one would find somewhat common phenomena like rise and fall of studios, dominance of stars, primacy of narrative cinema etc. However, there are characteristics that are unique to the country/region that also hold true for the corresponding film industries. For example, the film industries in South Asia produce films that almost necessarily have songs. I think in the contemporary neoliberal times, the logic of spectacle has become so dominating (superhero film in Hollywood or star vehicles in Bollywood), that it has become restricting for the scope of cinema.

#### Interviewer: Who makes the most honest films? Please explain why you say so.

**Dr. Pal:** I will just name my all-time favorite filmmaker, Luis Bunuel. The Spanish filmmaker had a chequered, eventful career in which he was thrown out of several countries because of his unsparing approach towards a decadent and immoral bourgeois culture that produced a long and prolific filmmaking career.

#### Interviewer: What is the secret sauce behind a good screenplay? Can it be taught/learned?

**Dr. Pal:** A screenplay can be good in many ways. One can have a tight plotline, or a strong emotional core, or great character arcs, or just be attentive to the space and time it is set in. I don't think there is any one secret sauce to a good screenplay but a really good work of art should be able to get to the truth of whatever it is dealing with.

I think screenplay writing can be taught to a certain extent. A good teacher can familiarize the students with the field, the variety of approaches that have been taken towards screenplay writing, and what the best screenplay writers have considered their best practices. But after that, it is up to the individual artist to find their own path towards truth.

#### Interviewer: Who is the best storyteller you know, and what makes him/her so?

**Dr. Pal:** I would name a non-filmmaker as an answer to this question. I think the best storyteller that I know is stand-up comedian George Carlin. Carlin's genius lies in his attention to detail and the ability to bring out the novelty from everyday mundane experiences. When this combined with a strongly opinionated and politically astute mind that was also unrelenting it its commitment to truth, it gave birth to Carlin, the legendary storyteller

#### Interviewer: Who captures what it means to be Bengali best?

**Dr. Pal:** Being a Bengali, like any other ethnicity, cannot be essentialized in any manner. One can mention certain loose characteristics that might define a Bengali, like obsession with food, the propensity for socializing (also known as adda) or a cultivated propensity towards the arts, but it is too varied to capture in a few set criteria. So, while it would be difficult to mention any one person who captures what it means to be a Bengali, I would like to mention Lalon Fakir because of how his life and work symbolizes Bengal's syncretism and cuts across religion and region to truly become Bengal's very own.

#### Interviewer: What made you want to come to NSU? What is your impression so far?

**Dr. Pal:** I had heard the PSS department had faculty openings and I was aware of NSU's reputation of being Bangladesh's top ranked university and its oldest private university. Whatever information I could gather, gave me the impression of a robust academic culture and collegiality in the campus. My initial impressions confirm what I had heard and hoped for about NSU. While the university has been welcoming in terms of facilities, my colleagues have also been extremely generous and helpful, not to mention the students who have also been extremely receptive and welcoming.

#### Interviewer: Briefly describe your teaching philosophy.

**Dr. Pal:** I believe that education should cut across boundaries and should be ultimately accessible to everyone. Education literally creates the future generation and shapes society. So, teaching is an extremely responsible profession that can do both incredible good as well as incalculable harm. Therefore, I believe that education should reach students wherever they are in terms of their upbringing, mental and emotional journey, and their own individual growth. And for that to happen efficiently, teachers should approach education with kindness, generosity, patience and lots of love. That is what I strive to achieve in my own job.


#### Interviewer: Anything else you would like to share?

**Dr. Pal:** I would just like to share my happiness and excitement on getting the chance to come and work in Bangladesh. Apart from being a vibrant country with some of the most generous people in the world, Bangladesh is also where my ancestral roots lie. Both my parents were born in Bangladesh (erstwhile India, and then, East Pakistan), spent some of their formative years here, and then migrated to India due to communal violence. All my life, I have heard them fondly remember their childhood days in Bangladesh and all those stories have made me fond of the country, even though I never managed to visit before accepting the job offer at NSU. Now that I am here in Dhaka, my short stay so far has been wonderful. While NSU is a great workplace and Bangladeshi food is generally wonderful, it is the warmth coming from the people that makes me glad that I could come to Bangladesh.

### Oxford Summer Camp, London 2023

# Team Impact Diplomats become First-ever Cohort from NSU in prestigious Millennium Fellowship:

For the very first time in North South University's illustrative history, a cohort of 20+ students—who call themselves the Impact Diplomats--have been selected for the distinguished and highly competitive Millennium Fellowship Class of 2023 jointly organized by the United Nations (UNA9) and Millennium Campus Network (MCN). A global youth leadership development program, this year accounted for the Millennium Fellowship's highest applicant number (44,000 students) from more than 190 countries. Including universities from the likes of the Ivy League, Oxbridge, and other prestigious portmanteaus, only around 260+ campuses from 38 countries worldwide were selected to host the 4,000+ Millennium Fellows this year (9% acceptance rate), Among them sits our Impact Diplomats team from NSU—a historic milestone achieved after more than 7 months of strategic efforts and perseverance.

The Millennium Fellowship aims to mobilize youth advocacy for the UN Sustainable Development Goals and the UNAI Principles. The Founding Organization, MCN, along with the support of the United Nations Academic Impact, bring together the most socially engaged youth leaders from around the world every year to support their unique social impact projects. The Fellowship provides these youth with Community Impact skill-building, Networking and Partnership-building skills, and Social Leadership skills. Graduates of the Fellowship go on to lead their own Social Impact initiatives or pursue satisfactory careers across renowned social impact organizations. Team Impact Diplomats believe they can benefit immensely from the program's offerings, and they have high ambitions for their project and fellowship tenure.

The project that secured this monumental feat for North South University goes by the name "The Breaktime Student Athletes", a project led by Mahiat Shan under his organization, Breaktime Foundation. Mahiat Shan, famously known for his advocacy of the SDG 13 (Climate Action) through his ClimateScience Olympiad promotional event as the Campus Coordinator of ClimateScience at NSU (See The Bridge Issue #31 pages 17 and 22), is back again with his team, the Impact Diplomats, to advance the UN SDGs within North South University.

As a brief description of the project, here's what Mahiat and his team had to say: "A significant proportion of the population in Dhaka city falls below the poverty line, inevitably resulting in adverse and unforgiving survival challenges for those inhabitants. A concerning aftermath of poverty is when children belonging to such families are forced towards the ruthless job of a breadwinner, oftentimes depriving them of a healthy diet and lifestyle, basic education, or even recreation. Another pressing repercussion that arises as a by-product of child labour is children leaning towards drug abuse as a coping mechanism from hunger, depression, and pain as their lives spiral around dog-eat-dog struggle in search of a better living.

The Breaktime Student Athletes project aims to tackle these issues by establishing a source of means for such children to ease them from their breadwinning responsibilities so that they can pursue an empowering education. At the heart of Breaktime Foundation's values are Sports, Collaboration, and Charity. Hence, sticking to its roots, Team Impact Diplomats aims to use sports as a medium of aid for the underprivileged and underserved members of our society. They plan to host multi-sports charity tournaments, bringing together sports enthusiasts from all socioeconomic classes to engage in a fun and meaningful outcome—educating the youth of Bangladesh.

Through their tournaments, their key goal is to establish a sustainable fund stream for children to chase an education rather than money while simultaneously enjoying the fruits of their youth. To realize this ambitious plan, Breaktime Foundation aims to partner up with NGO schools, renowned Brands, Public Figures, Financial firms, etc. and they believe the NSU Student Community can come together to support them in their initiative. The



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Breaktime Student Athletes project aims to leave behind a lasting impact, hoping to continue empowering many such children beyond the Millennium Fellowship tenure."

Impact Diplomats have also stated that their minimum goal is to help 20 children pursue their education, and they plan to establish a community of Social impact Leaders and SDG advocates within and beyond North South University. Their project advances the following UN SDGs: SDG 4 (Quality Education), SDG 10 (Reduced Inequalities), and SDG 17 (Partnerships for the Goals). Additionally, they are also achieving the UNAI Principle #3–Education for All–through their inquisitive ideas.
