Mr. Javed Muneer Ahmad, Chairman, NSU Board of Trustees Visits Stanford and UC Berkeley, USA

North South University, visited Stanford University and the University of



California, Berkeley, USA between September 7th and 13th, 2023. During this exploratory visit, Mr. Ahmad engaged in substantive discussions with various Department Chairs, professors, and researchers at these two prestigious universities.



At Stanford University, Mr. Ahmad met with Dr. Stephen Luby, Professor of Medicine - Infectious Diseases and Epidemiology and Population Health and Professor Michael Snyder, Chair, Dept. of Genetics and Director, Center for Genomics and Personalized Medicine at Stanford University, USA. Notably, Dr. Luby's active involvement with the NSU Genome Research Institute's collaborative works resulted in a Science publication (https://www.science.org/doi/10.1126/science.abi9069#con2). Interestingly, this research publication also had deep contribution by Dr. Laura Kwong of UC Berkeley whom Mr. Ahmad also met during his visit to Berkeley.

The meetings between Mr. Ahmad and the representatives from Stanford University delved into the manifold opportunities both institutions offer. The purpose of the meetings was to explore collaborative prospects between NSU and Stanford University. Discussions encompassed potential joint research projects, graduate research collaboration,

multidisciplinary research, faculty and staff capacity building, collaboration at Departmental and School levels and various other avenues of mutual benefit. The dialogue emphasized the opportunity of enhancing the global collaboration and possibilities available to researchers and students from both institutions. These productive meetings were foundational in nature with the goal of facilitating a meaningful relationship between NSU and Stanford University.

During Mr. Ahmad's visit to the University of California, Berkeley he met with Professor Karl A. van Bibber, Shankar Sastry Chair for Leadership and Innovation and Professor and Executive Associate Dean for the College of Engineering and Dr. Massimiliano Fratoni, Associate Professor and Chair, Xenel Distinguished Professor of Energy Engineering. Mr. Ahmad also met Dr. Laura Kwong, Assistant Professor, Environmental Health Sciences, at the School of Public Health. It is notable that Dr. Laura Kwong has previously led research work in collaboration with NSU leading to research publication and is hoping to be able to continue further research collaboration with NSU in the near future. Mr. Ahmad also had meetings with Dr. Kenichi Soga, Donald H. McLaughlin Chair in Mineral Engineering and Dr. Nicholas Sitar, Edward G. Cahill and John R. Cahill Professor of Civil Engineering at the University of California, Berkeley. Mr. Ahmad also visited The Berkeley Artificial Intelligence Research (BAIR) Lab and met with researchers there as well.

The discussions at UC Berkeley revolved around potential collaboration and joint research in the various research and graduate programs with strong opportunities for NSU researchers and students. The meetings also provided an opportunity to review and discuss past collaborations with NSU and other Bangladeshi institutions, capacity building for faculty members in research, collaboration in further joint research and deepening expertise in fieldwork, especially related to climate change, public health and engineering. Professor Nicholas Sitar graciously hosted Mr. Ahmad for a delightful lunch at the Faculty Club of UC Berkeley and gave a grand tour filled with insider historical information and commentary of the beautiful UC Berkeley campus.

The envisioned collaborations of NSU with both Standford University and University of California, Berkeley seek to amplify the global reach and heighten the potential of NSU students and researchers. The ultimate objective would be to provide NSU Students and researchers with avenues for international exposure and academic growth. The meetings that Mr. Ahmad had at these two prestigious universities in California signify the commencement of promising collaboration, friend-ship, and potential institutional partnership with NSU, poised to be further explored and deepened in the near future.

NSU Delegation Visit to China



A delegation from North South University participated in the Confucius Institute (CI) board meeting hosted at Yunnan University on October 11, 2023. The meeting was attended by esteemed members of NSU's administration, including Mr. Javed Muneer Ahmad, Chairman of the Board of Trustees at NSU, Professor Atiqul Islam, the Vice Chancellor of NSU, and key directors of various NSU institutes and offices. The board meeting commenced with an address by Mr. Javed Muneer Ahmad, Chairman of the Board of Trustees at NSU, who set the tone for the proceedings. Subsequently,

Professor Atiqul Islam, Vice Chancellor of NSU, and Prof. Hu

Jinming, Vice President of Yunnan University, shared their valuable insights with the board members.

The board meeting featured comprehensive discussions on various issues related to the activities and performance of the Confucius Institute for 2022-2023. Ms. Ma Xiaoyan, the Chinese Director of CI at NSU, presented the annual report encompassing the institute's activities and financial status. Dr. Md. Bulbul Ashraf Siddiqi, Local Director of CI at NSU, outlined the work plan and budget for the upcoming year, covering 2023-2024. All the presented reports and plans garnered unanimous approval from the board members, which consisted of representatives from both NSU and Yunnan University.



Several key topics were addressed during the meeting. One of the noteworthy discussions pertained to establishing a joint undergraduate program focusing on Chinese Language and Culture. This initiative involves collaborative efforts from both NSU and Yunnan University. The proposal for the renovation of the speech laboratory within the Confucius Institute at NSU and the construction of a multifunctional smart classroom also received board approval. Financial matters related to these initiatives were deliberated during the planning and budget session.

Additionally, it was decided that NSU would host the next board meeting in November 2024, ensuring continuity in discussions and collaborations between the two institutions. The board explored opportunities to expand the activities of the China-South Asia Centre for Socio-Cultural Studies (CSCSS). Furthermore, discussions revolved around the development of an Interpretation Studies Program encompassing Bangla, Chinese, and English, along with the inception of summer camp

programs, reciprocal dialogues with ambassadors, and the creation of an International Joint Laboratory for Remote Sensing Monitoring of Natural Resources, which involves collaboration between China, Laos, Bangladesh, and Myanmar within the Yunnan Province.

On October 12, 2023, a noteworthy session ensued between NSU and Yunnan University's Department of Ethnology and Sociology to renew the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) initially signed in 2019. Both institutions expressed their commitment to promoting the activities of the China-South Asia Centre for Socio-Cultural Studies (CSCSS). The meeting discussed three pivotal issues, including organizing an international conference in 2024 under CSCSS, encouraging student and faculty exchanges, and initiating collaborative research endeavors between Yunnan University and NSU.



Moreover, Professor Md. Jakariya from NSU held an extensive meeting with Assoc. Prof. Chen Junxu, Vice Dean of the School of Earth Sciences, focusing on the development of the International Joint Laboratory for Remote Sensing Monitoring of Natural Resources, a collaborative initiative encompassing China, Laos, Bangladesh, and Myanmar in the Yunnan Province. This exchange between NSU and Yunnan University exemplifies their commitment to nurturing scholarly interactions and interdisciplinary collaborations for the betterment of academic and cultural engagement between Bangladesh and China.

Falling Walls with DAAD: German Academic Exchange Service



On September 3rd, 2023, North South University hosted Falling Walls Lab Bangladesh 2023. This event provided an exceptional opportunity for students and early professionals to showcase their research projects, business plans, or social initiatives. IEEE NSU Student Branch had the privilege of partnering with this event, held on campus, in collaboration with DAAD and the Federal Foreign Office.

Falling Walls Lab is a unique pitch competition that allows

young researchers and entrepreneurs to present their groundbreaking ideas, highlighting their positive impact on science and society. Participants create 3-minute presentation videos to convince an international jury of scientists, entrepreneurs, and founders of their innovative idea.

This Lab is open to students, researchers, and entrepreneurs from Bangladesh, offering a chance to win the first prize: a trip to Berlin, Germany. The winner has the opportunity to pitch at the Falling Walls Lab final and attend the prestigious Falling Walls Conference in November 2023.

Various NSU and CPD officials also attended

Professor Atiqul Islam stated the significance of this partnership, noting that this partnership marks a historic moment in NSU's pursuit of excellence in academia and research. He anticipated that working with CPD would produce ground-breaking successes and advance the growth of this nation. CPD Special Fellow Dr. Debapriya Bhattacharya emphasized how this partnership fits CPD's mission of advocating for sustainable development and conducting evidence-based policy research. Their

objective is to tackle Bangladesh's significant socioeconomic problems using this partnership. Dr. Fahmida Khatun highlighted CPD's dedication to disseminating

cutting-edge information and research, especially with young students. She expressed optimism about the potential benefits of the collaboration for both institutions.

Shiyan Sadik, a lecturer for NSU's Department of Environmental Science and Management, delivered the opening remarks. For NSU and CPD, this partnership signifies a step toward establishing academic and research actions. Through shared efforts, they aim to address critical issues, promote sustainable development, and foster innovative research, all while engaging closely with students and the wider community.



What's Your Story? (Episode 19)

The nineteenth installment of "What's Your Story" was broadcast via Facebook Live on September 04, 2023. The distinguished guest for this episode was Professor Miraz Rahman, Chair in Medicinal Chemistry, Director of MRC DTP iCASE in Biomedical Sciences, and serving as the Antimicrobial Research Theme Lead at King's College London, United Kingdom (UK).

Prof. Rahman embarked on his academic journey with a Bachelor of Pharmacy (B. Pharm) and subsequently earned a Master of Pharmacy (M. Pharm) in the field of Pharmacy in 2000. Early in his career, he spent three years as a Research and Development Pharmacist at Eskayef Bangladesh Ltd. Following this, he ventured into academia, commencing as a lecturer at Asia Pacific University in 2000. His academic path led him to the University of Dhaka in 2003, where he began as a lecturer and was eventually promoted to assistant professor in 2005.

Prof. Rahman's pursuit of higher education took him to the United



Kingdom, where he pursued his Ph.D. in Synthetic and Medicinal Chemistry at UCL School of Pharmacy. After completing his Ph.D. in 2008, he continued his research journey at UCL as a postdoctoral fellow until 2011. During this phase, his research activities were concentrated on the application of advanced computational chemistry, synthetic medicinal chemistry, and chemical biology techniques. These techniques were applied in the design, synthesis, and evaluation of novel drug-like chemical scaffolds, mainly focusing on anticancer and anti-infective agents.

In 2012, Prof. Rahman made a significant move in his career by joining King's College London as a lecturer. Over the years, he progressed professionally, gaining recognition for his contributions. He was promoted to senior lecturer in 2015, followed by attaining the rank of reader in Medicinal Chemistry in 2018. The pinnacle of his academic career was reached in 2021 when he was promoted to Professor and Chair in Medicinal Chemistry.

Substantial achievements have marked Prof. Rahman's academic journey. He holds an impressive tally of 16 patents to his name as an inventor. His scholarly contributions are evident in his authorship of over 90 research publications. His inventorship of 15 patents further exemplifies his innovative mindset. Accumulating more than 15 years of research experience in the fields of Medicinal Chemistry and Biophysical Techniques, Prof. Rahman has made significant strides in advancing these domains.

A notable facet of Prof. Rahman's research endeavors is his focus on pyrrolobenzodiazepine-based DNA binding agents, a field he has been dedicated to for

16 years. Within this area, he has successfully developed PBD-based anticancer and antibacterial agents, some of which have been patented and licensed to university spin-out companies. His research spans early and late-stage drug discovery, and he actively engages in translational research. Prof. Rahman has even co-founded two biotech companies in the realm of oncology, namely Transcriptogen Ltd and Femtogenix Ltd.

Hailing from Faridpur, Prof. Rahman's educational journey led him to various places within Bangladesh, including Kushtia, Khulna, Barisal, and ultimately, Dhaka, where he completed his Higher Secondary Certificate (HSC) at Dhaka College. He is one of six siblings. Prof. Rahman generously shared advice for aspiring students. He emphasized the benefits of pursuing education in the UK, where students can experience a more comprehensive and independent educational journey. Prof. Rahman secured a scholarship based on his academic achievements and research publications in UK universities.

As of May 2023, he had submitted his most recent patent. He is currently engaged in two additional patent projects in collaboration with the University of Surrey, focusing on tuberculosis research. Prof. Rahman also plays a pivotal role in leading a module at King's College London related to Medicinal Discovery and Development. He takes charge of one of the most significant industrial case Ph.D. programs in the UK.

His parting words of wisdom for students are to prepare for the unexpected, believe in their capabilities, acknowledge their limitations, and never allow these limitations to hinder their progress. This recounting provides a glimpse into the professional journey of Professor Miraz Rahman, underscoring his remarkable contributions to Medicinal Chemistry and Biophysics and his valuable insights into academic and career advancement.

During the meeting, NSU and LPU engaged in a productive dialogue and reviewed preliminary plans for the exchange tour. Additionally, the first collaborative project planned between NSU and LPU involves establishing a joint architecture studio for students. It was collectively agreed that further discussions and meetings will be necessary to solidify any details before proceeding with the finalization of this initiative.

The event occurred at NSU's main auditorium and brought together prominent figures and enthusiastic students to discuss this vital subject, "সমতন্ত্ৰ".





The event featured esteemed attendees, including the Honorable Vice-Chancellor of NSU, Professor Atiqul Islam, and the deans and chairs of every department at NSU. From BRAC, notable figures such as Ms. Nobonita Chowdhury, Director of Gender Justice and Diversity (GJD); Mr. Tanvir Islam, Program Manager, GJD; and Ms. Nurunnahar, Manager, Advocacy and Networking, GJD, graced the occasion with their presence.

The event aimed to foster awareness and understanding of gender equity and diversity, strongly emphasizing student engagement. The auditorium was brimming with eager students eager to participate and learn. The session, masterfully led by Ms. Nobonita Chowdhury, commenced with a spirited debate between two NSU teams. The topic under scrutiny was gender discrimination, specifically the argument of whether it is derogatory to encourage women to prioritize home and family over career ambitions. The exchange of arguments and counter-arguments generated enthusiastic debate and dynamic discussion among the audience. Eventually, the debate was concluded with a vote of thanks and the acknowledgment of the team that presented the most compelling arguments.

Ms. Nobonita's session commenced with a thought-provoking speech about gender discrimination, particularly the challenges faced by women. This session was highly interactive, encouraging active participation from students. Male students shared their observations of differential treatment within their families and among their siblings, notably sisters. Students also openly discussed their experiences of gender-based discrimination in various aspects of life, including home,



school, friendships, and even within the university. The discussions delved into critical issues such as gender violence, sexual harassment, and abuse, as well as the actions required to address these concerns and the responsibilities that society bears.

Ms. Nobonita's engaging and insightful facilitation fostered an

atmosphere where students could discuss topics often considered taboo in the context of Bangladesh. The session answered pressing questions and outlined planned actions to combat the consequences of a patriarchal society. The impact of this event resonated with the students, reflecting the importance of

open dialogues surrounding gender justice and diversity. It was a momentous occasion marked by enlightenment and inspiration, with Mr. Mehedi Masud Sumon, Officer of the Office of External Affairs, receiving well-deserved accolades for his coordination efforts. The event concluded with a heartfelt token of appreciation presented to the BRAC team, a testament to their lasting impression on the NSU community.

The purpose of this meeting was for Ms. Lee to provide an introduction to FDU's Vancouver Campus and to share information about their activities in Bangladesh. The discussions during the meeting revolved around exploring potential areas of collaboration between FDU's Vancouver Campus and NSU. These included research initiatives, short-term student exchange programs, and faculty exchange opportunities.

The meeting was highly productive, with fruitful conversations on possible collaborations. It was also agreed that future meetings would be scheduled to solidify these partnership opportunities further. Additionally, there were discussions regarding establishing connections between NSU and FDU's campus in New Jersey, USA.



U.S. Ambassador's Visit to NSU



The Office of External Affairs (OEA) at North South University, jointly with the Center for Peace Studies (CPS) of the South Asian Institute for Political Governance (SIPG), had the distinct privilege of hosting the esteemed United States Ambassador to Bangladesh, His Excellency Mr. Peter D. Haas, on the occasion of International Peace Day. This event marked a momentous occasion, with Ambassador Haas as the keynote speaker.

Distinguished attendees at this event included the Honorable Vice-Chancellor of North South University, Professor Atiqul Islam, and the former Pro-Vice-Chancellor, Professor M. Ismail Hossain, alongside other esteemed leaders within the university. Mr. Javed Muneer Ahmad, Chairman of the

Board of Trustees, NSU, was present as a special guest. The focus of the event was a discussion centered on the five pillars of Indo-Pacific peace strategies, which bear universal significance and align with the United Nations' vision of promoting global peace.





Ambassador Haas underscored the U.S. Embassy's active engagement in supporting forthcoming elections in

Bangladesh, emphasizing the importance of ensuring fair and equitable polls. This commitment to fostering peace was a recurrent theme throughout the Ambassador's address.

Furthermore, Ambassador Haas elaborated on the International Visitor Leadership Program

(IVLP), a cornerstone of the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs. The IVLP is pivotal in building mutual understanding between the United States and other nations through short-term visits facilitating exchanges for current and emerging foreign leaders. Notably, even the founding father of Bangladesh, Sheikh Mujibur

Rahman, partook in the IVLP Program, illustrating the strong ties between Bangladesh and the United States. Ambassador Haas then discussed the five pillars of the United States' Indo-Pacific Strategies: free and open, connected, prosperous, secure, and resilient.

The first pillar, "free and open," encapsulates the belief that peace thrives in an environment where nations exercise autonomy to make decisions aligned with their interests. It emphasizes respecting

sovereignty, enabling each country to choose its path, partners, and leadership freely. The United States and Bangladesh jointly advocate for a world where nations' choices are upheld and supported. This commitment extends to promoting common approaches to critical technologies, internet governance, and cyberspace that safeguard privacy and human dignity. As Bangladesh approaches its national election, the pledge remains to ensure a free, fair, and peaceful election process, with a



steadfast stance against the oppression of journalists, media figures, and Nobel laureates who hold their governments accountable.



Moreover, the pillar of "connected" was elucidated as an essential element of global peace and prosperity. Ambassador Haas highlighted the significance of people-to-people relationships, describing them as the linchpin of international cooperation. These connections foster understanding and collaboration within and beyond regions and are facilitated through cultural exchanges, trade partnerships, and educational initiatives.

"Prosperous" is another vital pillar, reflecting the U.S. government's commitment to promoting economic growth to ensure no country is left behind in the 21st century. Economic growth is intrinsically linked to peace, providing opportunities for individuals to improve their lives, alleviate poverty, and reduce the risk of conflicts born out of desperation. The United States and Bangladesh share a vision of economic prosperity for all, characterized by trade, investment, and development cooperation to enhance the livelihoods of their citizens.

The pillar of "security" was highlighted as essential for lasting peace, as it creates a stable environment where countries can thrive without fearing conflict or aggression. Ambassador Haas emphasized the commitment of the United States and Bangladesh to

regional security, acknowledging their collaboration on a range of challenges.

Lastly, "resilience" was deemed a critical pillar, accentuating the importance of tackling global challenges together. Climate change and health crises transcend borders and require joint efforts to build resilience and respond effectively to shared global emergencies. The United States and Bangladesh are dedicated to addressing these challenges collectively.

Ambassador Haas also shared the U.S. Embassy's support for Bangladesh in fighting health and climate crises, including providing 150 million vaccine doses and exchanging healthcare workers during the COVID-19 pandemic. He addressed the Rohingya crisis, stressing the global responsibility to create conditions in Myanmar that enable the dignified return of Rohingyas to their homeland. They must be protected, educated, and allowed to live with dignity.

The event concluded with an engaging Q&A session with students, where they raised questions about national and international crises and the U.S.'s role in supporting



them. In recognition of his invaluable contributions, a token of appreciation was presented to His Excellency Mr. Haas by the Honorable Vice-Chancellor of North South University.

NSU Delegation Visit to Japan

Un September 21, 2023, North South University, represented by the Honorable Vice Chancellor, Professor Atiqul Islam, Professor Mohammad Khasro Miah, Director of the Career and Placement Center (CPC), and Mr. AKM Ahmedul Islam Babu, Director of BAS9S, embarked on a significant visit to Miyazaki, Japan, as the honored guests of Miyazaki University. This visit was made possible through the support of the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA).



The visit began with a highly successful seminar, graced by Professor Atiqul Islam, Professor Mohammad Khasro Miah, and distinguished representatives from Miyazaki University. The primary focus of this seminar was to strengthen collaborative efforts for the B-JET center, the nucleus of two transformative programs: The B-JET (Bangladesh-Japan ICT Engineers' Training

Program) and B-MEET (Bangladesh-Miyazaki

ICT Engineers' Educational Training Program). North South University's pivotal role as the home base for the B-JET Centre was celebrated as these initiatives have, to date, enabled 85 percent of B-JET graduates to enter the Japanese job market. Through its collaboration with Miyazaki University, NSU-CPC remains ardently committed to implementing and enhancing these programs.

Moreover, Professor Atigul Islam, during the visit, gained valuable insights into the professional achievements of B-JET graduates, observing their work conditions and adapting to different circumstances. This visit also featured meetings with IT industry leaders, who expressed their satisfaction with B-JET graduates, commending their adaptability. They welcomed continued collaboration for future recruitment initiatives. The visit concluded with a promise from the Miyazaki Mayor to create a cricket field exclusively for Bangladeshi B-JET graduates, ensuring a balanced work-life environment. This visit significantly strengthened the



bond between NSU and its Japanese partners and opened up new avenues of collaboration for educational and professional endeavors.

Seminar on "Supply Chain Management: Resilience and Sustainability" by Curtin University

Un September 25, 2023, the Office of External Affairs at North South University (NSU) organized a collaborative seminar with Curtin University, Australia. This seminar featured a special lecture by Professor Mohammed Quaddus, Professor

School of Management at Curtin University. The focal point of this lecture was "Supply Chain Management: Resilience and Sustainability." The seminar drew attendees from NSU, including both
students and esteemed faculty members. It served as a platform for delving into the world of supply chain management,
with Professor Quaddus shedding light on the interplay between resilience and sustainability in this critical domain.

Resilience, as elucidated by Professor Quaddus, pertains to a supply chain's capacity to endure and rebound from disruptions. In his lecture, he elaborated on the various measures that can be undertaken to enhance resilience in supply chain management. These include diversifying the supplier base, investing in redundant capacity, and devising comprehensive contingency plans. Sustainability, on the other hand, is about infusing environmental and social considerations into the fabric of

supply chains. To achieve sustainability, Professor Quaddus highlighted several strategies, such as reducing energy consumption, minimizing waste generation, and raising labor standards.

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One pivotal message of the lecture was that resilience and sustainability are not conflicting objectives but rather can complement each other. Sustainable supply chains, with their diverse supplier networks, utilization of renewable resources, and strong stakeholder relationships, often exhibit greater resilience compared to traditional supply chains. Professor Quaddus presented compelling examples that showcased the synergy between resilience and sustainability. Diversifying the supplier base, for instance, not only safeguards against disruptions but also reduces the ecological footprint by incorporating suppliers with varying environmental practices.



Investing in renewable energy sources, aside from reducing the supply chain's

Planning Meeting with Goa Institute of Management, India



However, for those aspiring to work as developers, acquiring an in-depth understanding is paramount. Essential skills mentioned included learning SQL and comprehending the entire ETL process, delving into Python, mastering Excel with VBA logic, and becoming proficient in Microsoft Power BI and Qlik Sense. He noted that extensive expertise in a few areas often trumps superficial knowledge across many disciplines, making it essential to identify and specialize in one's chosen field.



Subsequently, Mr. Anwar stressed the importance of academic pursuits and research along with the necessary skills. To excel as a researcher, one must immerse oneself in reading, meticulously studying hundreds of articles, and skillfully employing citations and references in their work. While acknowledging the evolving educational landscape in Bangladesh, he emphasized the transformation in the teaching approach that emphasizes reading as a prerequisite to effective writing. Furthermore, he noted that certificates from various workshops and courses can enhance one's prospects in the job market.




A prominent public university situated in the Northern Territory of Australia, CDU boasts multiple campuses across the region, including Darwin, Casuarina, Alice Springs, and Katherine. As the largest university in the Northern Territory, CDU offers an extensive array of undergraduate and postgraduate programs spanning diverse disciplines such as business, education, engineering, health, humanities, and social sciences. The Darwin campus, located at the heart of the city, provides an optimal setting for academic pursuits. Its central location offers convenient access to various amenities, including shops, restaurants, and other essential facilities.



The campus exudes a modern and dynamic atmosphere, boasting resources like a library, a student union, and a sports and recreation center. Beyond Darwin, CDU's presence extends to regional areas of the Northern Territory. The Casuarina campus, located approximately 10 kilometers from Darwin, houses the CDU School of Health and CDU School of Engineering and Technology. To initiate the application process, prospective students can visit the official CDU website and create an online



account. With this account, applicants can explore their preferred programs and commence the application procedure.

Within its diverse academic offerings, CDU provides an array of master's programs tailored to nurture advanced knowledge and skills in various fields. Notable among these programs are Master of Business Administration (MBA), Master of Education, Master of Engineering, Master of Health Science, Master of Humanities and Social Sciences, Master of Indigenous Knowledge, and Master of Science. CDU also extends vocational programs in the form of certificates and diplomas designed to equip students with the practical skills necessary to launch careers in specific sectors. Popular vocational programs include Certificate IV in Accounting, Diploma of Nursing, Diploma of Engineering, Diploma of Early Childhood Education and Care, Certificate IV in Hospitality, and Diploma of Business.

To alleviate the financial burden of higher education, CDU offers a range of scholarships, each awarded based on distinct criteria. ties and smallholder farmers in Bangladesh.

IFAD's current work in Bangladesh concentrates on two key areas. Ms. Huq embarked on her academic journey at North South University (NSU) in 2000, enrolling in the Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) program. Her association with NSU continued as she pursued her Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree, which she completed in 2005. Over the years, she has accumulated diverse professional experiences, having worked with notable organizations such as Save The Children Australia, Banglalink, Jobs 9CT Ltd, and Therap BD Ltd, among others. Currently, Ms. Huq holds the position of Team Leader of Investment Strategy in the Department of Transport in Melbourne, Australia.



Ms. Huq's professional journey began with her dedicated service as a volunteer receptionist, signifying her commitment to achieving financial independence and her concurrent collaboration with her husband. Ms. Huq underscores the importance of appointing team leaders based on experience and qualifications rather than gender, emphasizing the significance of selecting individuals who can guide and assist their team members effectively.



His educational journey commenced in an English-medium school, and, for students like him, the options were limited—study abroad, enroll in the Institute of Business Administration (IBA) at Dhaka University, or choose a private university. At the time and even now, NSU is one of Bangladesh's premier institutions. The smaller campus of his era holds a special place in his heart, and he cherishes visits to the old campus road, a tangible connection to cherished memories. Today's NSU alumni have come a long way, but two decades ago, the future was uncertain for many. Despite past uncertainties, the alumni have succeeded and secured prestigious positions worldwide, transcending initial doubts. Mr. Khan's advice to current students is to focus less on grades and more on ethical practices, emphasizing that dedication to doing the right thing ultimately leads to the right places.



Nobel Laureate Sir Richard J. Roberts discusses "GMO Crops in Bangladesh: Policies and Practices"

The South Asian Institute of Policy and Governance (SIPG) and the NSU-UWA Agribusiness Centre of Excellence (ACE) of North South University organized a distinguished event on October 28, 2023. This significant gathering featured a talk by the Nobel Laureate Sir Richard J. Roberts, who delivered insights on the pertinent subject of 'GMO Crops in Bangladesh: Policies and Practices.' The seminar aimed to critically assess and deliberate upon the existing policies and practices associated with GMO crops in Bangladesh, focusing on recognizing the prominent challenges and advancements in research and production within this domain.



The keynote speaker for this prestigious occasion was Sir Richard J. Roberts, a Nobel Laureate in Physiology or Medicine in 1993, known for his outstanding contributions to science. The session was graced by Professor Atiqul Islam, the Vice Chancellor of NSU, who held the position of session chair. The panel of experts included Mr. Anwar Faruque, Former Secretary of the Ministry of Agriculture, Government of Bangladesh; Professor Dr. Abdul Khaleque from NSU's Department of

Biochemistry and Microbiology; Dr. M Mahfuzul Haque, an Associate Professor at SIPG, NSU; and Dr. Md. Shawkat Islam Sohel, an Assistant Professor in the Department of Environmental Science and Management at NSU.



Sir Richard J. Roberts brought valuable insights into the conversation, shedding light on the perceived contradictions within the anti-GMO movement. He addressed the pressing global issue of hunger and presented GMOs as a potential solution. Roberts underscored the need for a nuanced perspective on the term 'Genetically Modified Organism,' emphasizing that genetic modification has been an integral aspect of plant and animal breeding practices for centuries, driven by the mechanisms of natural evolution. He further stressed the importance of exercising caution and awaiting scientific validation when considering innovations carrying potential risks without conclusive safety evidence.

Professor Atiqul Islam, Vice Chancellor of NSU, highlighted the challenges in persuading policy makers regarding GM food's potential to combat prevalent vitamin deficiencies among the Bangladeshi population. Mr. Faruque delved into the multifaceted challenges associated with ensuring food security in Bangladesh, while Prof. Khaleque illuminated the pivotal role of biotechnology in fostering agricultural innovations within the nation. Dr. Haque provided comprehensive insights into the GMO policy landscape in Bangladesh, contributing to the overall understanding of this complex field. Dr. Sohel elucidated the environmental concerns that arise from the introduction of GMO crops within the country.

This event stands as a testament to NSU's dedication to fostering informed discussions and collaborations on topics of global significance, underscoring its commitment to advancing knowledge and making meaningful contributions to the field of policy and governance. Bioactivities of Malaysian Plant Extracts, TAR UMT, Malaysia

On October 30, 2023, an insightful webinar was conducted through Facebook Live, marking a collaborative endeavor between North South University (NSU) and Tunku Abdul Rahman University College, Universiti Malaysia Terengganu (TAR UMT), Malaysia. The distinguished keynote speaker for the event was Assoc. Prof. Dr. Sheri-Ann Tan Shu Wei from the Department of Bioscience, Faculty of Applied Sciences at TAR UMT.




Commencing the webinar, an introductory segment cast a spotlight on the Department of Bioscience at TAR UMT, providing an illuminating glimpse into the university's cutting-edge laboratory facilities. Dr. Wei then ventured on an engaging presentation focusing on her pioneering research in phytochemicals and phytocompounds. Her research pursuits encompass a trifecta of approaches, encompassing phytochemical experiments, cell-based assays, and computational analyses. These methods converge to achieve multifaceted research objectives, including the exploration of antioxidative compounds associated with anti-aging, the inhibition of virulence proteins implicated in age-related disorders like Alzheimer's and rheumatoid arthritis, and the integration of bioengineering methodologies into the realm of natural product research for regenerative medicine. Importantly, these research goals are thoughtfully aligned with the Sustainable Development Goals.

Malaysia's natural diversity, brimming with thousands of medicinal plants, offers the potential for deriving medicinal solutions. The development of herbal

products is also recognized as a catalyst for economic growth, a fact underscored by the Malaysian government. Dr. Wei shared some of her previous research endeavors, which included work with papaya leaf fractions, highlighting their chemopreventive potential on stressed human liver cells. She also delved into her exploration of the antioxidative and photocytotoxic effects of plant extracts, a novel avenue that holds promise for generating oxidative stress in cancer cells, leading to apoptosis.

Furthermore, her research has extended to investigate plant extracts for their liver protective potential, marking an essential advancement in the domain of hepatoprotection. In looking to the future, Dr. Wei aims to contribute to fabricating herbal scaffolds tailored for tissue repair and regeneration, a field in which she has already made notable strides.

Dr. Hasan Mahmud Reza, Dean of the School of Life and Health Sciences, NSU, attended the webinar articulating the parallels between the research endeavors at NSU and TAR UMT. He highlighted the potential for future collaborations, including the possibility of PhD candidates from TAR UMT working at NSU. The establishment



of joint research proposals and collaborative funding mechanisms was also explored between the webinar attendees, underpinning the foundations for a flourishing and enduring partnership between the two institutions. His closing words encapsulated the spirit of mutual contribution and the enduring strength of collaborative research endeavors.

9 am Faysal Bashar from Melbourne, Australia, an NSU graduate from batch 001. 9 am a Technology Consultant by profession, with 18+ years of industry experience in technology consulting, digital transformation, technical solution design, product management, and technology transformation strategy development for the latest telecommunication networks/solutions like 3G, 4G, 5G, 90T, and telco-cloud. My first job after finishing my bachelor's from NSU in 2004 was at Sirius Broadband BD Ltd., where 9 worked to introduce the country's first wireless internet service. My journey in the telecommunication industry started in 2005 by joining HUAWE9, followed by leading global telecommunication company Ericsson in 2007 as an engineer in their Bangladesh offices. In 2009, 9 became part of Ericsson Southeast Asia, where 9 led and collaborated in multiple major and complex network transformation projects in Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, and Bangladesh. Since moving to Ericsson Australia in 2012, 9 have been working as a Solution Architect, where 9 provide technology consulting services for Ericsson's major customers from Australia and New Zealand (i.e., Telstra and Optus in Australia, Spark in New Zealand).

9 started my MBA after taking a long break from my studies and finished it with distinction in 2021 from Melbourne Business School (MBS). MBS has been ranked as the top business school in Australia for many years and one of the leading business schools in world ranking. 9 have certifications in SAFe® 5 Scrum Master (CSM), SAFe® 5 Agilest, and 9T9L Foundation v3. 9 have completed a course on "9nnovation Management (Disruptive strategy)" from the London Business School (LBS) executive education and "Leading Digital Transformation" from the Stockholm School of Economics.

Life at NSU:

9 am from the 2000 batch (001) of North South University and studied computer science. 9 attended the convocation in 2004. During our time, NSU only offered five undergraduate degrees to study (Computer Science, Business Administration, English, Economics, and Environmental Science). We didn't have any option to study telecommunication and not even any engineering

degree. However, before 9 finished my degree at NSU, 9 was able to do two fourth-year elective courses on Telecommunication Engineering, which later helped me to step into the Telecommunications Industry as an engineer.

As a student at NSU, 9 was highly involved in many extracurricular activities. 9 was the founder of the NSU Media Club, which used to publish a monthly newsletter named "NSU News." 9 organized many activities, including seminars, workshops, picnics, a yearly convention for university reporters, and other student life-related activities. 9 was involved with organizing the NSU Club fair and NSU convocations.

I live in Melbourne with my wife and one child. My wife is also an NSU graduate, currently working as a Team leader of investment strategy in the Department of Transport of the Victorian state Government, Australia.

Interviewer: Tell us about your extracurricular activities during student life. Why do you think students should actively take part in extracurricular activities during their student lives?

Faysal: I was highly involved in many extracurricular activities during my NSU days. I was the founder of the NSU Media Club, which used to publish a monthly newsletter named "NSU News." I was involved in organizing many activities, including seminars, workshops, picnics, a yearly convention for university reporters, and other

student life-related activities. I organized the NSU Club Fair and Convocations during my time at NSU.

The real-world skills students can learn through participating in different club activities and other extracurricular activities are invaluable. These activities help them learn how to manage their time better and, most importantly, help them develop as a team player. Moreover, extracurricular activities also help students to develop their analytical and problem-solving skills. Participation in Extracurricular activities supports students' character development by giving them skills required for personal success, such as leadership skills, communication skills, and the ability to accept constructive criticism. These activities also help students build a network of acquaintances, which could become helpful in later life. When students finish studying at NSU, they won't have any experience to put in their CV. Extracurricular activities on the resume can be a huge plus when applying for jobs right after coming out of NSU. These activities allow companies to analyze the skills and capabilities of a fresh graduate. These give them an idea of the strengths and weaknesses of a student. Most companies are looking for employees who are team players. New graduates can thus embellish their resumes by showing potential employers their commitment to a task and ability to work hard in a team.

However, over-scheduling in excessive activities can decrease the benefits of participation in extracurricular activities. How do you keep a perfect balance between such activities and studies? My suggestion is not to get into too many clubs and exhaust yourself completely. You will need superhuman capabilities if you are looking to register for more than one (or a maximum of two) clubs at a time, along with study pressure at NSU. Therefore, take on as much as you can absorb. Choose your clubs wisely; you never know, they might even unfold into a career path in the coming years.

Interviewer: How much impact do you think NSU had in your career and life?

Faysal: My time at NSU had an enormous impact on my overall career and life. Whatever I achieved in my career is mostly because of NSU. Exposure to world-class teaching and curriculum and a network of professionally successful, well-established alumni contributed a lot to my professional journey and progress in my career.

In early 2000, NSU was the only university in Bangladesh teaching Telecommunication engineering courses. No University, including NSU, was offering a degree in Telecommunication Engineering. However, at NSU, I had the opportunity to do a few fourth-year elective courses that covered the most advanced technologies of that time. We also had the opportunity to learn from industry experts as the senior engineers/leaders from the telecommunication industry shared how the actual technologies were implemented in those elective classes. The exposure to those subjects opened up the opportunity for me to do an internship with the Radio Network Planning Department of Sheba Telecom (Currently known as Banglalink), where I worked to develop a radio network planning tool. As a result, by the time I graduated from NSU, I was already well ahead in terms of practical knowledge and skills compared to the competition.

In my personal life, what I am today is because of my time at NSU. I met my life partner at NSU. After graduating from NSU and starting both of our careers, we got married and started our family. Eventually, we both decided to move to Australia and live in Melbourne with our only daughter.

Interviewer: What are your plans and goals? Where do you want to see yourself in the future?

Faysal: I have been working in the Telecommunication industry for over 18 years. I have developed deep expertise in technologies in this field. I have recently found myself in a transitional period of my career where I need to transform my profile from in-depth technical roles to a strategy-focused senior leadership pathway. To expedite this journey and push me towards that pathway, I have completed my MBA from Melbourne Business School (MBS) and a few relevant professional courses from London Business School (LBS) and Stockholm School of Economics (SSE). By covering the additional academic side on top of my long experience in technology, I see myself ready to make the next moves toward strategy-focused senior leadership roles in a big corporation.

On a personal side, I'd like to give back to my country in whatever way I can—I recently started a not-for-profit organization here in Australia to promote and showcase Bangladeshi culture, heritage, history, and handicrafts. I am also trying to create a bridge between Bangladeshi businesses and the markets in Australia. Besides that, I'd like to give back to my North South University community. Keeping that in mind, recently established for NSU Alumni under the banner "NSU Alumni Association Australia " (NSUAAA).

Interviewer: Tell us about the newly formed alumni NSU association in Australia and what you want to achieve through this.

Faysal: Today, NSU alumni are thriving around the world, each possessing a unique set of skills and competencies. We believe that by uniting and supporting one another, we can all grow and prosper. To facilitate that support network, we have started a platform under the banner "NSU Alumni Association Australia" (NSUAAA). Our vision is to advance NSU and its alumni by engaging its global community to its fullest potential and cultivating their passion and loyalty to the university and the country.

Within this platform, we have introduced a Mentorship program consisting of notable alumni from different parts of the world across all career choices. Any alumni can seek out experienced peers with the required competencies and skills and book one-on-one sessions. These sessions can cover various aspects, including career guidance, knowledge sharing, resume/CV reviews, interview preparation, job referrals, coaching, and training. We have also implemented a job board that provides members with early access to job opportunities at organizations where our alumni are employed.

Additionally, we offer regular training and coaching sessions. Our alumni conduct these programs and cover various hands-on topics to enhance soft and hard skills. For example, an NSU alumni, currently an Associate Professor at the State University of New York and a leadership trainer, has recently offered free leadership training for NSU alumni through our platform. We also have alumni experts in areas like Artificial Intelligence (AI) who conduct sessions on topics such as Generative AI.

We have specific programs to support newly migrated NSU alumni in Australia. The process of settling in a new country can be challenging, and we aim to provide comprehensive support, ranging from airport pick-up, accommodation arrangement, and preparing for the first job interview. Our goal is to ensure they feel

supported during the transition, providing training and coaching for job placements and connecting them with a broader network. Furthermore, we have initiated an Entrepreneurial support program. Many alumni offer products and services, from educational consultancy to taxation support and home-made catering services. We list these services within our platform, categorized for easy access, ensuring our members receive the necessary exposure, promotion, and the best value for their money, whether as consumers or service providers.

I request all NSU alumni currently residing in Australia or planning to relocate to join our platform "nsuaa.org.au." By doing so, you can support your fellow NSUers and leverage the network to your advantage. Together, we will become a stronger and more connected community.

Interviewer: What would be your suggestions to the current students and fresh graduates of NSU as alumni?

Faysal: My suggestion will be to start making as many connections with NSU alumni as possible in your chosen field before graduation. Not only will this improve your chances of landing a job, but those who know someone in the industry often land more coveted roles than those who just apply to job ads. Entering the job market may feel like being thrown into the deep end, but the key to navigating this stage is to draw on the experience of those who have been through it. Build your network! You will find highly successful NSU alumni in almost every industry globally. If you plan to go for higher studies, try to connect with NSU Alumni in academia in your field of interest. You will even find a lot of NSU alumni are now teaching in universities in the USA, UK, Canada, and Australia. The best way to accelerate your career growth is by finding the right mentor who can help guide you through your early career and beyond. make Bhutan a true Shangri-La. One practice I hold especially dear in Bhutan is the concept of Gross National Happiness (GNH). This unique measure of progress reflects the deep-seated values of our society, where the well-being and contentment of our people take precedence over economic gains. The emphasis placed on GNH over GDP speaks to the core of Bhutan's identity, and it resonates with my belief in the importance of prioritizing the happiness and welfare of our citizens. In a world often fixated on material wealth, Bhutan's commitment to GNH is a source of inspiration, reminding us that true prosperity is rooted in the happiness and well-being of its people.

Interviewer: How do you think the educational systems in Bhutan and Bangladesh differ, and how has this impacted your academic experience? Kezang: The education systems in Bhutan and Bangladesh differ in several ways, reflecting the unique cultural, economic, and social contexts of each country. English is the primary medium of instruction in Bhutanese schools and higher education institutions, starting from the primary level. Whereas Bengali (Bangla) is the primary language of instruction in Bangladesh, English being taught as a subject. The Bhutanese education system emphasizes holistic assessment, focusing on continuous evaluation and developing a student's overall personality. In Bangladesh, board examinations, such as the Secondary School Certificate (SSC) and Higher Secondary Certificate (HSC) exams, are significant milestones in a student's academic journey, and there is a strong focus on exam performance.

Interviewer: What challenges have you faced as an international student, and how have you overcome them in a new cultural and academic environment? Kezang: The primary challenge I encountered as an international student was the language barrier. However, once I started university, I realized that English was the common communication medium for everyone, making it much more manageable. While Bangladesh and Bhutan share some similarities, I did experience a bit of cultural shock when I first arrived. Being away from home, even though not severely, did take an emotional toll on me. There are moments when I find myself missing the comfort of my home.

Interviewer: Bhutan is known for its unique approach to measuring Gross National Happiness (GNH). How has this Bhutanese philosophy impacted your perspective on life and your studies?

Kezang: The GNH philosophy is rooted in the idea that well-being and happiness should be the primary focus of a nation's development rather than economic indicators like GDP. GNH encourages individuals to prioritize their well-being and happiness. This can lead to a greater focus on mental and emotional health, personal fulfillment, and life satisfaction. GNH places a strong emphasis on community and social relationships. This leads me to value connections with family, friends, and the broader community, which can enrich my life and studies through support and a sense of belonging.

GNH also highlights the importance of environmental sustainability and the preservation of natural resources. This perspective allowed me to be more environmentally conscious and incorporate sustainability into their lives and studies. Incorporating GNH philosophy into one's perspective on life and studies can lead to a more fulfilling and purpose-driven approach. 
