





### **NSU Alumni Talk Show 138**

Despite the inherent challenges of startup ventures, Ms. Zahin emphasizes the importance of acquiring a broad understanding of









### Delegation Visit from Macquarie University, Australia

A delegation from Macquarie University (MQU) visited North South University (NSU) on January 30, 2024, to explore collaboration opportunities outlined in their existing Memorandum of Understanding (MoU). The meeting was attended by esteemed members from both institutions, including deans, directors, and faculty members.



Dr. Javed Bari, Dean of NSU's School of Engineering and Physical Sciences (SEPS), provided an introduction to NSU, highlighting its diverse programs and recent additions, such as graduate-level programs in Civil Engineering and Mathematics. Discussions ensued on further development of engineering programs and the potential introduction of biomedical programs. Both institutions engaged in discussions regarding specific department-level collaborative activities, aiming for joint research initiatives, student and faculty exchanges, joint seminars, and collaborative design projects. The possibility of joint Ph.D. programs (Cotutelle) was also explored, pending approval from the University Grants Commission (UGC) for NSU's Ph.D. programs.





NSU's Office of External Affairs (OEA) highlighted its extensive NGO/INGO network, offering avenues for research initiatives. Collaboration proposals, such as aiding NSU's Department of Architecture in urban heritage research and study abroad opportunities for NSU students, were also discussed. The meeting concluded with a positive outlook, with both institutions agreeing to initiate collaborative activities in civil engineering and electrical engineering, thereby strengthening their partnership and paving the way for future endeavors.

### Collaboration Meeting with MacEwan University, Canada



A collaborative meeting was convened via Zoom between MacEwan University in Canada and North South University

Representing NSU were Dr. Katherine Li, the Director, the Office of External Affairs (OEA); Dr. Hasanuzzaman Sohail, the Assistant

Director, OEA; Ms. Samina Alam Miti, International Affairs Officer, OEA; Ms. Tasnia Azmeri Madiha, Coordination Officer, OEA; and Mr. Mehedi Masud Sumon, Officer, OEA.

The primary agenda of the meeting was to discuss study tours that both universities would jointly host under their collaborative partnership. MacEwan Universities ty expressed a keen interest in exploring further possibilities for student mobility collaboration in the upcoming months. North South University expressed its openness to the idea of an agreement where NSU could host a small group of students for a study tour, and MacEwan could receive an exchange student for a semester. Of specific interest were the areas of Economics and Business at MacEwan University, which sought NSU's support in organizing a study tour involving ten students and two faculty members, commencing in 2025 and continuing in alternating years. These departments also aimed to understand how NSU could assist in terms of logistical arrangements, planning visits to businesses and NGOs, and facilitating academic and student connections.

In response, NSU presented a draft outlining the details of its short study tour plan for the upcoming months, emphasizing its focus on students interested in the Ready-Made Garment (RMG) sector and sustainable development programs. NSU already has established collaborations with numerous NGOs engaged in work related to sustainable development goals. At the conclusion of the meeting, it was decided that a follow-up meeting would be scheduled once final decisions regarding the study tour plans had been made. Both universities expressed their enthusiasm for bringing this plan to fruition and were content with the progress of the discussions.

### Delegation Visit from the University of Adelaide, Australia

On January 31, 2024, a delegation from the University of Adelaide (UoA) visited the Office of External Affairs (OEA) at North South University (NSU). ### Collaboration Meeting with Queen's University, Canada



From NSU, Dr. Katherine Li, Director, Office of External Affairs (OEA); Dr. Norman Kenneth Swazo, Director, Office of Research; Dr. Javed Bari, Dean, School of Engineering & Physical Sciences (SEPS); Dr. Hasanuzzaman Sohail, Assistant Director, OEA; and Ms. Tasnia Azmeri Madiha, Coordination Officer, OEA was present in the meeting with Dr. Fahim Quadir, Vice-Provost and Dean, Queen's University, Canada.

The primary agenda of the meeting was to explore mutually beneficial relationships between NSU and Queen's University. Key areas of collaboration identified during the discussion included research collaboration, dual degree programs, and faculty and student exchange initiatives.

Regarding research collaboration, both institutions expressed interest in exploring joint research projects in climate change, clean energy, climate resilience, nuclear waste management, water and human health, and sustainability. Plans for a follow-up meeting were discussed to delve into the specifics of potential research collaborations. Additionally, the possibility of introducing dual degree programs was explored, allowing students to obtain degrees from both institutions. Details regarding the structure and implementation of such programs will be further discussed and finalized.

Furthermore, NSU and Queen's University expressed interest in facilitating faculty and student exchanges. These exchange programs



would encompass various academic disciplines and levels, providing enriching experiences for participants. Potential activities include undergraduate and postgraduate student exchanges, faculty exchanges for research collaborations, teaching expertise interchange, short-term visiting lectures, and administrative knowledge transfer sessions.

While these ideas require further development, both institutions are committed to exploring and solidifying these areas of collaboration. The meeting concluded with a shared enthusiasm for building a meaningful partnership between Queen's University and North South University.

### Meeting with Professor Tamara Jackson, University of Adelaide, Australia

The Rupantar project aims to achieve sustainable, efficient, diversified food systems at scale in the EGP by understanding interactions between technologies, scaling interventions, and policy settings. It employs a phased approach to understanding the context for diversification, distilling key lessons, and applying them in local activities in Bangladesh, West Bengal, and Nepal. The project emphasizes monitoring change and strategic communication with stakeholders.

The discussion also revolved around assessing the adoption and diffusion of agricultural innovations in Bangladesh. The meeting strengthened the bond under the existing MoU and fostered excitement for future collaboration in research and project sectors,

particularly with the NSU-UWA Agribusiness Centre of Excellence (ACE), benefitting both institutions.

With strong community support, Uttaran Shanghai, a youth club, was established, leading to the recognition of larger social issues beyond education. Collaboration with NGOs like BRAC and WPF has been instrumental in addressing challenges related to safe water and nutrition, with a focus on

creating sustainable models and influencing government policies.

UTTARAN operates with a strategic plan spanning five years, aligning its efforts with national development structures and prioritizing local knowledge. While not directly targeting Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), the organization integrates SDG-related objectives into its operational framework to better address community needs and achieve tangible outcomes. With a presence in 28 upazilas, UTTARAN aims to foster a society characterized by gender, class, and caste equality through six core programs.

Mr. Shashoto emphasized the importance of research tailored to community needs, advocating for action-oriented and need-based research approaches. Besides, he thanked the NSU authority for being an MoU between NSU and UTTARAN. At the same time, he invited NSU students to engage in internships, field trips, and learning workshops to gain practical insights into rural development challenges. Additionally, opportunities for research collaboration with NSU faculty members were highlighted as avenues for mutual learning and impact.

# Student Exchange Planning Meeting with the University of Kent, UK


# University of Kent

OEA; Ms. Tasnia Azmeri Madiha, Coordination Officer, OEA; and Ms. Sadia Jeesan


Ayesha, International Ambassador, OEA.



Additionally, discussions encompassed program activities, accommodation arrangements, credit limits, and other pertinent details.


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The meeting proved highly productive, and NSU eagerly anticipates sending students to the UBC Okanagan Campus for this enriching opportunity.

### Collaboration Meeting with Awaj Foundation



A virtual meeting was convened on February 14, 2024, between the Office of External Affairs (OEA) at NSU and the Awaj Foundation via Zoom. From NSU, Dr. Mohammad Jalal Uddin Sikder, Assistant Professor, Department of Political Science and Sociology; Dr. Katherine Li, Director, OEA; and Mr. Mehedi Masud Sumon, Officer, OEA, participated. Representing Awaj Foundation were Ms. Nazma Akter,

Founder and Executive Director; Ms. Ismet Jarin, Project Coordinator; Mr. Md. Imran Rahman, Project Coordinator; and Ms. Sampreety Ali, Communication Officer.

Ms. Akter initiated the meeting with an overview of the Awaj Foundation, a Bangladeshi non-profit organization advocating for improved working conditions in the garment industry. Their focus is on promoting fair treatment and gender equality, empowering primarily women workers through rights education, legal assistance, and community support.

Additionally, they conduct advocacy campaigns at national and international levels, such as successfully advocating for a raise in the minimum wage for garment workers.

Ms. Jarin emphasized the need to collaborate with students on gender-based violence issues, highlighting its prevalence not only in workplaces but also in the entire society. Areas of potential collaboration include researching reasons behind the high turnover rate of female garment workers, developing maternity facilities, addressing workers' rights violations, and combating gender-based violence, etc.

Ms. Akter further elaborated on the organization's challenges and achievements, suggesting research opportunities to explore successful industry practices, automation, and climate change impacts.



Dr. Li underscored the importance of educating local and international students about the garment industry and its alignment with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). She emphasized that such knowledge dissemination could improve global awareness of worker rights, inform better management practices among factory owners, and educate consumers about ethical considerations in their purchasing decisions.

The meeting concluded with the decision to draft a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) for further collaboration between NSU and the Awaj Foundation.

Once finalized, the MoU will pave the way for enhanced partnerships and initiatives to address challenges within the garment industry and advance gender equality.

University's Faculty of Design in Fukuoka, Japan, took place from February 4 to February 17, 2024. This initiative, established by the



## Collaboration Meeting with Practical Action, Bangladesh

n February 25, 2024, a virtual meeting was convened between the Office of External Affairs (OEA) at NSU and Practical Action, Bangladesh via Zoom. Representing Practical Action were Dr. Shawkat Begum, Country Director; Ms. Tamanna Rahman, Thematic Lead for Climate and Resilience Portfolio; Mr. Tahmid Hossain, Thematic Lead for Waste and Sanitation; and Ms. Anika Ahmed Upoma, Assistant Officer in the Fundraising and Business Development





Unit. From NSU, attendees included Dr. Katherine Li, Director of OEA; Md. Shiyan Sadik, Lecturer in Environmental Science and Management; and Mr. Mehedi Masud Sumon, Officer in OEA.

At the outset of the meeting, Dr. Li provided an overview of OEA's objectives and practices before yielding the floor to Dr. Begum, who introduced Practical Action, Bangladesh, originating in the UK and now an international organization focusing on enhancing regional capacity and fostering learning. Dr. Begum highlighted their diverse activities, including waste management, sanitation, agriculture, and renewable energy initiatives aimed at bolstering resilience in communities.

Notably, their Climate Change and Resilience program prioritizes early warning systems for natural disasters and collaborates with the government on disaster preparedness apps.

Ms. Rahman elaborated on a project investigating the impacts of climate-induced hazards on food security in Faridpur and Satkhira. Practical Action's efforts extend to addressing plastic pollution by exploring

methods to convert waste into alternative energy sources. Additionally, they operate a compost research and training center in Faridpur. Mr. Hossain emphasized Practical Action's readiness to support students interested in waste management and sanitation sectors, offering research collaboration opportunities.

Mr. Sadik proposed hosting seminars and dialogues to disseminate knowledge among NSU students, supplementing collaborative efforts. Dr. Li underscored the interdisciplinary nature of the projects, acknowledging their appeal to faculties beyond environmental and ecological fields. The meeting concluded with anticipation for future collaboration, with further details to be discussed in upcoming sessions.

All in all, the meeting highlighted the potential for a fruitful collaboration between NSU and Practical Action, with both parties eager to explore joint research, publications, and knowledge-sharing initiatives in environmental sustainability and community resilience through the signing of an MoU.

### **International Student Feature**

Nada Ali Monsen is an Egyptian student who is currently studying in the Biochemistry and Biotechnology department. She was born and raised in Egypt but moved to Bangladesh when she was 7, which has been her home for the past 14 years. Despite moving to a whole different continent, she has grown fond of Egyptian and Arabic culture and media, especially 70s Egyptian music. Some of her favorite artists include Fairuz, Abdel Halim Hafiz, and the Al-Fajer Palestinian group.

Between all the hours spent studying (and crying. and questioning her sanity) over all her biochemistry courses, Nada really enjoys reading fiction and learning languages. Some of her favorite books include Piranesi by Susanna Clarke, Babel by RF Kuang, and Sword of Kaigen by ML Wang. She is currently self-studying Japanese, Turkish, Bengali, and German, at varying levels of proficiency. Nada wishes to use different languages to connect with and gain deeper insights into various cultures, including her own.

**Interviewer:** Can you discuss the differences in educational systems between Egypt and Bangladesh, and how you've adapted to the academic environment in Bangladesh?

Nada: I have been here for years now but I remember my biggest obstacle was the language barrier for sure. I did not know any Bangla (naturally) and barely understood English. I was so young and it felt like all my classmates already knew each other so well, and I could not understand a word. I remember being scared I will never be able to have friends and I will be lonely forever. I don't remember particularly putting in any proper effort to learn Bangla but being so immersed in the language and hearing it being spoken around me for so many years definitely helped me absorb it in a way. I feel like being



in an environment like this so early in my life far from Egypt was the main reason for my love of languages now that I think about it; I could not speak Arabic since no one will understand me so I had to use my two weakest and nonexistent languages. Now learning languages here and there no matter how little is one of my favorite hobbies!

Interviewer: What initially sparked your interest in biochemistry, and how do you see it influencing your career goals?

Nada: I always thought I wanted to get into medicine, a surgeon, to be more specific. I lived with the idea of being a doctor for most of my life until I realized that I didn't like the idea of it anymore. I did still love biology and I enjoy chemistry the same way some people might enjoy math (controversial I know). So, biochemistry felt like the obvious. I started reading more about the field and I realized that I would enjoy it way more than medicine; I love the idea of research, I love seeing how science develops and advances and being able to contribute to that no matter how little feels perfect for me.

Interviewer: In what ways do you believe your cultural background and upbringing have influenced your perspective on scientific research and academic pursuits?

Nada: Egypt's culture is very heavily influenced by religion, so my upbringing has been very influenced by Islamic teachings and traditions. I was always told that seeking knowledge is the highest form of faith and worship in Islam. Also, I used to always bother my mom with all types of annoying questions, and despite it all she still patiently did her best to answer them. I think this was a big factor in my wanting to go into a field that is so research-oriented instead of a more "well-known" field.

Interviewer: Have you encountered any cross-cultural differences in academic or social settings at NSU, and how have you navigated them?

Nada: Growing up, I was always surrounded by people of different cultures and religions. I remember my friend groups at some parts of my life looking like a diverse friend group in a Western movie. With that, I would think nothing could ever surprise me, but it made me realize that I was too young to care that much about my friend's backgrounds since we were young and didn't have that many opinions yet. Also, my school was a pretty Muslim school so I never truly grasped the idea of religious differences. NSU definitely has a more diverse environment than my old school and you get to see and hear many religions or lack thereof. I feel like this made me a more empathetic person. Instead of getting defensive I learnt to actually listen to and think about other people's beliefs and in a way I think it has influenced my own faith. So overall it was more helpful to me than an obstacle really.

**Nada:** I love this question!! I think the book that had the biggest impact on me in that sense was Piranesi by Susanna Clarke. It's a very dreamy book, and it's very speculative in a way. It's hard to explain what it's "exactly" about without giving the whole story away, but the main aspect of the book that resonated with me the most was Piranesi's character. I think it's very rare to see a character who is a scientist/researcher and also religious. A lot of people think that science and religion are mutually exclusive; like any interest or love you have for science is almost surface level if you also have faith or any religious practices, so it was very refreshing to see a character who, while being busy exploring and researching not let it get in the way of being religious, and vise versa. One of my favorite lines that resonated with me the most has to be: "The enormity of the task sometimes makes me feel dizzy, but as a scientist and an explorer, I have a duty to bear witness to the Splendors of the World." This is how I feel about being Muslim and have a passion in science. Knowledge is one way of worship and so is being witness to Allah's creation. It's a lovely book that will stay with me for a long, long time!

Interviewer: Looking ahead, what are your aspirations for further education or professional development after completing your undergraduate studies at NSU?

Nada: I think I will continue on to pursue a master's and a Ph.D. inshallah in biochemistry and/or molecular biology. Many people, especially in my culture (outside of academia at least) think that being a scientist sounds too childish, like a little kid saying they want to be an astronaut, but that's exactly what I want to be: a scientist

**Nada:** This will sound so basic but if you really do love the field, don't give up!! Biochemistry is really not for the weak and can get really hard at times (I have so much to review as I write this, actually), but still do not give up and think you are not meant for it even though you love it. You are not alone in the struggle and one bad grade does not make you a failure or that you are not good enough for the field. Biochemistry needs patience, more than anything else.

As for being in Bangladesh, try learning the language. I am by no means perfect and I am still working on my reading abilities but it makes navigating life here so much

easier. In my opinion, as international students I think it's only respectful to at least put an effort into speaking the language of the country we move to.

Mr. Parvez Karim Alobasi, is an Assistant Professor at the Department of Economics, East West University, Dhaka, Bangladesh. He had completed M.A. in Economics from York University, Toronto, Canada, 2004-2005 on a full scholarship and did his B. S. in Economics from North South University during 1999-2003. Mr. Abbasi's research interests primarily lies in the area of Geopolitics, Geo-economics, Political Economy and Energy Security, with special emphasis on BRI and IPS. He uses interdisciplinary approach consisting of Economics, History, Political Science, International Relations, and Sociology to analyze complex, multilayered sociopolitical and economic issues with domestic and international relevance. He has published multiple academic articles in both local as well as international peer-reviewed journals. He also has attended and presented papers at local as well as international conferences, seminars and roundtables. His most recent academic journal article is "Economic Drivers Shaping Bangladesh as a Trading State: The Relevance of Geopolitical Neutrality" published in the Journal of Governance, Security & Development, Volume 2. Number 2. January 2022. Mr. Abbasi occasionally writes op-eds and columns for English language publications in Dhaka which has been favorably received both at home and abroad. Some of his most recent articles include "Pondering the Palashi parable" on 26 February 2023 in the Long Form segment of Dhaka Tribune and "The Art of War of Hyder Ali & Tipu Sultan -Lessons for Small States in the Era of the New Great Game" on the 20 March 2022 issue of The Security World.

Mr. Abbasi is a member of the Strategic Studies Network of the Near East South Asia Center for Strategic Studies, a US Department of Defense (DoD) regional center focused on enhancing security cooperation between the U.S. and the NESA region. He had attended the 2016 Annual SSN Conference in Ankara, Turkey, March 31-April 3 2016, where he presented a paper on "Emerging Economic trends in NESA region" and gave an expert interview on the topic of "Balkanization of Middle East-A 21st Century reality?". He has also presented a paper "China in South Asia: A Geo-economic Analysis, A Brave New World" at the International Conference on The 1st Forum in China-India-Pakistan International Cooperation under the Framework of Shanghai Cooperation Organization organized by Center for China- India- Pakistan Studies, of Sichuan University of Science and Engineering, China in Eigong, 24-26 October 2019. Furthermore, he has Presented a paper "BRI & South Asia-An Economic Analysis" at the International Conference on Belt and Road Initiative and Indo-Pacific Strategy: Opportunities and Challenges." organized jointly by the Pathfinder Foundation, Sri Lanka and National Institute for South China Sea Studies (NISCSS), China in Colombo, 13 January 2020. He also presented a paper "China-Bangladesh Relations and the Quest for Economic Equiproximity" at International Conference on "Understanding China" organized by Nepal Institute for International Cooperation and Engagement (NISCE) via webinar, 16 August 2020, Kathmandu, Nepal. He also participated both as a speaker and a moderator in the two international conferences of 'Bay of Bengal Conversation' in Dhaka, during 2022 and 2023.

Mr. Abbasi was invited by the National Defence College Bangladesh, to deliver lecture at the National Defence Course 2022 and Armed Forces War Course 2022 and 2023. He also regularly gives lectures at the Development Administration Course for BCS Administration cadre officers in National Academy for Planning and Development (NAPD) institute of Ministry of Planning on topics such as Alternate Development Models, Economy of Health and Education in Bangladesh etc.

Mr. Abbasi frequently participates as an expert discussant in TV Talk shows on International relations, Geostrategic issues as well as trade and macroeconomic related themes on National TV.

**Interviewer:** Can you share a bit about your academic and professional background, and how you became interested in economics?

Mr. Abbasi: If I need to identify a point of origin for my academic odyssey, it must start with Sunbeams, where I had completed my primary education. Sunbeams back then had only up to Class V. We even had a graduation ceremony at the end of Class V back in 1990! I still remember that we were so sad to leave our beloved school nestled in a quiet leafy corner of Road 27, Dhanmondi. The next stint was at Scholastica, between 1991 and 1996, where I completed my O Levels and Class XI. The one thing that I would like to point out was the contrasting yet effective approaches in both these institutions-Sunbeams had a solid, demanding no-nonsense approach, whereas Scholastica allowed for more freedom and individual creativity. I did my A Levels from Mastermind in 1997 -98, which had just started out back then.

Spring of 1999 landed me in the Undergraduate Program of Economics Department of North South University. NSU was spread across amongst three buildings, Sher Plaza, Star Tower and BTA in Kemal Ataturk .Yet, the quality of education that I received there from the amazing faculty over there more than made up for my initial disappointment of not being able to go abroad, like my



school friends for my undergrad studies. Now that I look back, NSU truly provided us with quality North American education, for which I remain grateful. A special

mention should be made of the wonderful faculty that we had in our own Economics Department such as Professors A K Enamul Haque and Rafiqul Islam Molla. The academic support staff such as Department Secretary Biswajeet Da were extremely friendly and cooperative. What made the undergrad experience truly unique was the vibrant, energetic and very bright student body in the department as well as the university.

I then did my M.A. in Economics from York University, Toronto, Canada, 2004- 2005 on an exceedingly generous scholarship. Again, NSU was the conduit for my admission and scholarship, as Professor Mahmudul Anam of York University, used to teach at the Economics Department of North South during the summer semesters. A whole generation of Economic graduates had a shot at international graduate studies in Canada due to the foresight and catholicity of mind like Enam and Anam Sir.

I joined East West on a full time basis in January 2008 as a lecturer in the Economics Department and worked my way to the rank of Assistant Professor. I was overjoyed to find several friends of mine from NSU as colleagues in the Economics Department of East West University. Apart from teaching in the University, I have been engaged in research, particularly in the fields of geopolitics and geo-economics, where I carry out interdisciplinary analysis by combining the insights of economics, international relations, history and sociology.

I was drawn to Economics early on, while I was studying for it during my O Levels. Probably seeing Amartya Sen being awarded the Nobel Prize for Economics consciously or unconsciously encouraged a whole generation of South Asians to take up the study. It might sound as a cliché but Economics is truly the queen of social sciences. It investigates societal problems within an analytical framework and provides a range of feasible policy options to decision makers. By concerning with the stated objectives of raising social welfare, it touches every aspect of our lives. Whether it is Urban Economics or Health Economics or Energy Economics, the application of economics is continuously evolving and expanding. Economics will remain relevant as the preeminent social science subject as long as human beings continue to live in an organized society.

Interviewer: As an Assistant Professor, what courses do you teach, and what areas of economics are you particularly passionate about?

Mr. Abbasi: Well, the standard answer to this question, which I don't tire from saying with a straight face, is that I teach whatever course my department assigns me! Jokes aside, I usually teach third and fourth year courses such as Money and Banking, Contemporary issues in International Economics, Economics of Development in South Asia, Trade Policy Analysis, Asian and Emerging Economics, History of Economic Thought and Law and Economics. As my courses indicate, I am more interested in the applied aspects of economics, especially in the realm of political economy, geopolitics and geo-economics. Economic causes largely dominate the realm of domestic politics or influence the behavior of states in the international arena. The competition for scarce resources, whether it is oil or rare earth metals or gaining access to shipping lanes or cutting edge technology are all dominated by different strands of economic thinking or schools of thought. Even the concept of populism associated with international leaders like Trump, Erdoğan or Modi can be partly or largely explained by economics. I believe we will witness the transition from American unipolar domination to a more fragmented multipolar global order within our lifetime. The rising economic heft of Asian, African and Latin American countries is partially responsible for this momentous change. It is truly exciting to be an economist and witness and analyze and anticipate these trends.

Interviewer: What do you find most rewarding about teaching economics to students? Are there particular challenges you face in this role?

Mr. Abbasi: I confess I like to teach. Period. I have been teaching students ever since I finished A Levels. For most of the time I have taught economics to young impressionable minds, animated by eagerness to learn and question. I like the challenge of teaching and holding students' attention over long periods of time. An occasional dose of humor helps in class to relieve the monotony. By providing topical examples, I try to make my courses more relatable and exciting for my students. Mentoring young inquisitive people is a privilege, afforded to few. I believe that passion for teaching is a must. The challenge of teaching economics or any other subject is essentially the same-how to reach out to the comparatively weaker students, so that they don't feel left out. Plus, there is the onus of self-motivation for a teacher. If a teacher enters the class bored, dejected or listless, it surely rubs on among the entire class. Last but not least, there is a constant need for teachers to study and augment one's knowledge. Teaching is a dynamic process, which despite its demanding nature, can be pretty rewarding.

**Interviewer:** If you had the opportunity to advise policymakers in Bangladesh, what economic and geopolitical policies or strategies would you recommend to address current challenges and promote long-term growth?

**Mr. Abbasi:** Well, in terms of economic issues, my advice to policymakers is pretty straightforward and consistent. I have been saying so in the various seminars, conferences and talk shows that I happen to frequent. The policymakers must take steps in reducing income inequality in the society. To do so, qualitative and quantitative improvement must be made in the education and health sectors. Skills training and investing in Research and Development would be the key to create a large pool of highly skilled labor force. Bangladesh has predominantly a youthful population. Investing in the youth is the key to prosperity. A universal insurance and health-care system must be put in place. To do all this, the government must widen its tax base and cut down on wastage. Transparency, accountability, decentralization, devolution and good governance are essential to ensure sustainable development and poverty alleviation.

In terms of geopolitics, my advice to foreign policy mandarins and strategic thinkers would be to avoid temptation and pressure from the competing great powers and not firmly adhere to one camp or another during the time of the New Cold War. A policy of equiproximity or equidistance should be pursued. Economic and defense diplomacy should be robustly pursued to secure our strategic interests

Interviewer: Can you share some highlights of your recent research or publications? What topics are you currently exploring?

Mr. Abbasi: As I have already indicated, my area of research interest lies in the realm of geopolitics and geo-economics. I have been working on themes such as Great power competition ((USA vs. China), Belt and Road Initiative, Indo Pacific Strategy, Trade War, Tech War, the competition to secure access to hydrocarbon deposits, rare earth metals or advanced semiconductors. The most recent research article that I had published "Economic Drivers Shaping Bangladesh as a Trading State: The Relevance of Geopolitical Neutrality" explores these themes from a Bangladeshi perspective. History is a powerful tool to predict future events as we rarely learn from our mistakes. At present, I am researching on historical precedents of Bengal being caught in regional power competition and what lessons Bangladesh can draw from it. "Pondering the Palashi parable" that appeared in the long form of Dhaka Tribune is probably a partial manifestation of my current research pursuits or rather, a statement of research intent.

Interviewer: As an alumnus of NSU, what are your suggestions for NSUers who are interested in pursuing a career as economist?

Mr. Abbasi: Each person's journey is different and unique. Yet, looking back, from my days as a bright eyed undergrad student in the Economics Department of NSU, I would urge the current crop of econ undergrads to read. Read as much as possible. Read beyond textbooks and journal articles. Economics is more than journal articles and seminars. It is a living subject, which draws its inspiration from the society around us. Observe the people around you. Being well-read enables students to relate theories to real world happenings. Intellectual curiosity for students is a must. Then the journey becomes that much fulfilling and rewarding. A well-rounded education is more useful than a narrow one. In the end, enjoy what you do. Good Luck to all the NSUers interested in pursuing a career in economics! May you have a fantastic adventure? I end with the iconic salutation from Star Trek "May the Force be with You".

Interviewer: Tell us about where you grew up, went to school and the attitude of people around you toward education.

**Prof. Niaz:** I spent my formative years in Dhaka and pursued my undergraduate studies at the University of Dhaka. My academic journey continued in the USA, where I earned both my Master's and Ph.D. degrees. Education was highly valued in my family, as both sets of grandparents held prominent positions in the education sector, instilling a deep respect for learning. Interviewer: How did you develop your interest in Marketing and Communication?

**Prof. Niaz:** My book on "Cross-Cultural Content Analysis" emerged from the foundation laid during my doctoral research, which I expanded further during my postdoc Senior Fulbright fellowship.

Interviewer: How have you moved toward research on extremism?

Prof. Niaz: Observing the global shift towards extreme ideologies in social, political, religious, and global realms motivated me to delve into research on extremism. My aim is to offer recommendations for addressing and reforming this concerning trend.

Interviewer: You seem to be committed to SDG 4.7. Can you describe what you mean by sustainable intellectual development and a lifelong dedication to learning?

Prof. Niaz: Sustainable intellectual development involves a commitment to continuous learning, critical thinking, and adaptability across various facets of life. Lifelong dedication to learning extends beyond formal education, fostering personal and professional growth, problem-solving skills, and a meaningful life.

Interviewer: How does your global experience inform what you do in the classroom?

**Prof. Niaz:** My international background and diverse intercultural experiences shape my teaching approach. By incorporating global and multicultural perspectives, I offer insights into marketing, media, and communication issues, resonating well with students who appreciate the cross-cultural context.

Interviewer: What does it mean to be a global citizen and how can educators role model and cultivate global citizenship in students?
